

Stone named as dean of College of Arts and Sciences

Economics Professor Joe Stone was named the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences last Thursday.

"I think he's very well qualified," said Provost John Moseley, who appointed Stone. "He's one of our leading professors in the

nomics department, and in 1984 he took a leave of absence to accept a one-year appointment to the President's Council of Economic Advisers in Washington, D.C. There, he was a senior staff specialist in international trade policy.

When Stone came back to the University, he met with success as he was named the occupant of the University's W.E. Miner Chair in Economics in 1985. Three years later, he began to serve as the chair of the economics department, a job he held un-

til 1992. He then stepped up to the position of associate dean of social sciences at the College of Arts and Sciences from 1992-96.

"He's very experienced as an associate dean and the department head," Moseley said.

Moseley said Stone's knowledge of money and academia will contribute to his success as the dean.

"As an economics professor, he definitely understands economics, and he understands academic quality," Moseley said.

Stone is currently in England

ASUO Executive chooses 'good mix of people' for upcoming staff, Unger says

The 1997-98 ASUO Executive Staff has been chosen, and ASUO Vice president Ben Unger said the staff is comprised of students who are self-motivated, devoted and "who haven't all been involved with the ASUO."

"There's a tendency to hire [past] ASUOers, but we chose a good mix of people," Unger said. "I honestly think people are going to notice we're doing things differently."

Three of the biggest changes in the ASUO Executive Staff are the new positions that were created: Outreach Director Associate, the Outreach Director and the Voter Education Organizer.

The Outreach director will serve as a liaison between non-traditional students and the ASUO, but the position is no

longer called Non-Traditional Student Advocate because Miner and Unger wanted a qualified candidate, which meant filling the position with someone who is not a non-traditional student.

The Voter Education Organizer will work during the entire school year to encourage voter registration as well as voter participation during student body elections.

This position is to help the student body and community understand the importance of voting, Unger said. He noted the community especially needs to be "pro-University" by voting for aiding higher education.

He gave the example of Ballot Measure 47. The measure forced cuts in higher education, among other things. In addition, the ASUO plans to work with other universities, such as Portland State and Oregon State, to encourage this broad-based community support for higher education.

Another goal of the ASUO Executive is to make the ASUO of-

office, located in EMU Suite 4, more accessible and welcoming — literally. The office will be painted and "made more comfortable for good communication," Unger said.

By slightly changing the look of the office and appointing a new ASUO Executive Staff, the goal of the Executive is to encourage more of the student body to go to the Executive office with concerns, questions and requests for help, Unger said. There is one position unfilled on the ASUO Executive Staff — the Computer Support person — who will be chosen before the end of the school year.

Now that the ASUO Executive is revamped, Unger said he hopes that in the coming school
