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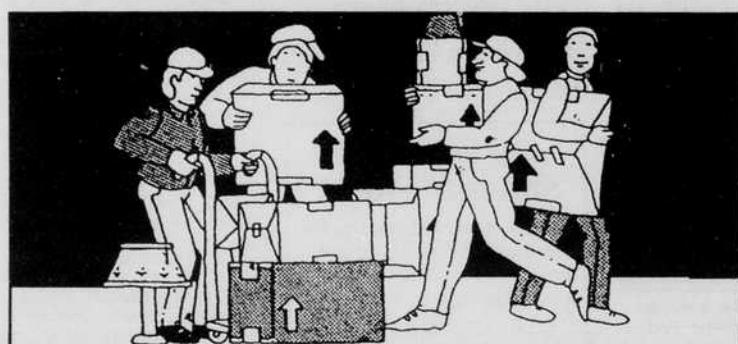
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Baumgartner: Future looks bright for Ducks

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that my family is here and my friends are here and we were down there during that earthquake and that was scary. The timing was just right."

From the moment Oregon got her back, it started paying off—slowly and quietly. Baumgartner dipped into the international pool of players and attracted the best to add to the skill of local star Paula Patterson.

She brought in Kylie Wilson from New Zealand and Karen Bristow from Australia two years ago, and Anika Heuser from Germany and Pam Sowden from New Zealand this year to propel the Ducks into seventh place at the NCAA Tournament.

"Recruiting is a crap shoot," Baumgartner said. "In recruiting, I'm not going to settle for second best. I'm going to go out there and get the best players. Obviously my first choice is from Oregon, but also from Washington, California and overseas. Oregon puts a lot of money into this program and they should have the top team."

Now that her team is nearing the top, Baumgartner is starting to get the accolades that come along with success. She was named Coach of the Year for both the Pacific-10 Conference and for the Far West District, where six of the top seven teams in the nation compete.

But she won't take the credit for it.

"It's an incredible award considering the Far West has the top teams in the country," Baumgartner said. "It's a tribute to my team because without their outstanding play the coaches would not have noticed that my team did so well. They won 90 percent of that award, they gave me that award and that means more to me than anything."

With only one junior, two sophomores and two freshmen on the Ducks' starting squad, the future looks pretty bright for Oregon, and Baumgartner, to come up big in the near future.

"I think that there's bigger and better things in store for women's golf at the University of Oregon," Baumgartner said. "I think that over the break, the team will improve tremendously and next year they're going to come back and make another statement that we weren't a fluke last year and we're even better this year, and we can keep this tradition going for a very long time."

Baumgartner's plans for the distant future, after her coaching career is over, might have Athletic Director Bill Moos uneasy about his job security.

"I want to coach until I don't have the enthusiasm for it anymore, and then I want to be an athletic director," Baumgartner said. "That's why I got my Ph.D. I feel like I can take my experiences as a student athlete and a coach and be an administrator that can

help coaches and student athletes reach their goals, like I have."

Baumgartner says if she could leave her players with one thing when they leave from Oregon, it would be something she has instilled in herself.

"I think that the most important thing that I can teach them is that hard work really does pay off. And if they work hard, good things will come to them," Baumgartner said. "I instill that discipline in them and expect them to be the best they can be. By the time they are seniors I want them to look back and say, 'Wow, I've never worked so hard in my life. What a great experience.'"

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
