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Dudley says he wants to stay

■ **BLAZERS:** Despite opting out of his contract to become a free agent, center Chris Dudley wants to return next season

PORTLAND — Chris Dudley says he wants to return to the Portland Trail Blazers next season, even though he has opted out of his contract with the team to become a free agent.

The Blazers also could re-sign Dudley at any amount — regardless of salary-cap restrictions — because of the Larry Bird exception.

"I want it made clear that my preference is to stay in Portland," Dudley said Tuesday. "From an organizational side and a team side, I've had a great experience here in the community. I feel very comfortable and very happy here."

Dudley opted out of a contract that would have paid him \$4 million in 1997-98 and \$13 million over the next three years.

"You could say it was a gamble, but I feel pretty confident and my agent feels pretty confident that I'll be able to get at least that back," Dudley said. "I wasn't necessarily doing it just for more money."

"I wanted to feel secure. I felt like I would regret it if I didn't opt out and Portland traded me somewhere a week after July 1."

Dudley said he told Blazers president Bob Whitsitt shortly before the All-Star break last season that he would opt out.

"Bob assured me he planned on re-signing me, that I would be back," Dudley said. "Unless things have changed, I'm hopeful it can happen, but in the meantime I'll be exploring all opportunities."

The Blazers have said they want to re-sign both Dudley and Clifford Robinson. Signing both seems unlikely if Dudley wants a long-term contract and at least \$5 million per year at the same time that Robinson is looking for \$7 million to \$10 million per year.

Whitsitt and assistant general manager Jim Paxson have some weighty decisions to make. If the Blazers lose both players, Paxson said, they would be about \$4 million under the salary cap, although the numbers would change when the cap goes to \$26.9 million on Aug. 15.

"There's no guarantee we could fill those spots with comparable players," Paxson said.

While agent Dan Fegan makes his rounds, Dudley also will be busy attending a wedding in the Washington, D.C., area, then flying to the NBA Players Association annual meeting Sunday through Thursday in Jamaica.

Dudley realizes he is in a good position. "This is all very exciting. On the other hand, it's also a little unsettling," he said. "I'll be glad when it's done."

Ewing signs four-year contract

NEW YORK — One day after becoming a free agent, center Patrick Ewing signed a new four-year contract with the New York Knicks on Wednesday.

Terms were not available but there had been speculation that Ewing — one of the most prominent players in the free-agent market — wanted to end his career in New York.

Salary cap constraints limited Ewing's options. Only a few teams like Detroit and Cleveland

had room under the cap for a player with a Ewing-sized contract.

Agent David Falk had been expected to demand between \$65 and \$70 million for four years. Miami center Alonzo Mourning, a close friend of Ewing's and also a Falk client, makes \$16 million per season, and Shaquille O'Neal of the Los Angeles Lakers is the league's highest-paid center at \$17.1 million.

Ewing, who will be 35 next month, has been the anchor of the franchise since the team made him the No. 1 pick in the NBA's first lottery draft in 1985.

"We had some unfinished business we've got to take care of," Ewing said. "We didn't get to our final goal last year. I've been here a long time and I want to be here when we win the championship. I'm glad I'll finish my career here in New York. These fans deserve a championship, and I hope to get one while I'm here."

Knicks management and Falk went to work on a new deal after midnight Monday when Ewing officially became a free agent.

Both sides worked through the day on Tuesday but refused comment on the talks. Agreement was reached in two all-night bargaining sessions, finishing at 4 a.m. Wednesday.

Also, no guides are provided on any of the trips, but according to Mason, people with international experience are often part of the trips.

In addition to helping organize trips, the program also offers low cost rental equipment. Most small items, including sleeping bags, stoves and mountain bike roof racks, are only \$1 per day.

The Outdoor Program can also help with transportation needs. Vans can be rented for 37 cents per mile for an Outdoor Program trip.

"We try to be able to facilitate trips and do so at as low a cost as possible," Mason said. The program, which receives its funding from student incidental fees, does not profit from any trip.

All trip costs are shared by everyone who takes part in the outing.

Mason estimated that an average whitewater rafting trip on the McKenzie River would cost \$10 through the Outdoor Program, while a private outing would run approximately \$60.

The program's Allard and Casey Memorial Safety Library also offers students a variety of safety equipment free of charge. Cell phones, VHF Radios, GPS

Units and Avalanche Transceivers, probes and shovels can all be checked out from the library. Instructional safety books and videos are also available.

All the equipment, however, is only available for Outdoor Program outings.

The program can also serve as a resource center, or "wilderness travel agency" as Mason calls it, for personal trip ideas or outdoor information. The program has a number of books, maps, guidebooks, magazines, videos and Internet references free for students' use.

Mason advises students to check in frequently for the next student scheduled trip. The trip sheet is also posted on the program's web page and is updated twice weekly.

This time of year, Mason urges all students to experience the outdoors

"The neat thing about Oregon in the summer is it has such a variety of things to do," Mason said. "It has every environment except tropical. I can't imagine a place with access to so many environments."
