Although Bender broke a rib against USC two weeks ago, he played three quarters against Boise State and is expected to start Saturday.

Joining Bender and Holmes in the front four are defensive ends Shane Boyle and Boose, who share the team lead with two sacks each.

"Boose and Doyle are quicker [than Holmes and Bender] and create havoc on the outside," Price said. "But they all have good quick moves and great first steps."

The linebacking corps is anchored by Moore, the team's top returning tackler from last season. He has notched a team-high six tackles for a loss this season.

"Brandon Moore is one of the most underrated linebackers in the league," Price said. "He has great speed and quickness, knows what he's doing and is a

great leader."

Linebacker Steve Gleason, a 5-foot-11, 215-pound sophomore who also plays centerfield for the Washington State baseball team, leads the team in tackles this season with 31.

Senior Duane Stewart, who has started 26 straight games for the Cougars, leads the defensive backfield, which also features safety Ray Jackson and corners LeJuan Gibbons and Dee Moronkola.

Another highlight for Washington State this season has been the play of its special teams.

Kicker Ryan Lindell is in his first varsity season, but shook off a poor performance against Illinois, in which he missed two field-goal attempts, by booting a 57-yard field goal against Boise State.

"I'm real pleased with Ryan Lindell and the job that he's done

for us," Price said.

Shawn Tims also supplied some highlight reel footage against the Broncos by returning a punt 73 yards for a touchdown.

While Leaf and Black have received much of the accolades on offense, none of their prodigious performances would have been possible without the offensive line.

Senior guard Jason McEndoo anchors the Cougars' offensive line, which averages 6-foot-5, 288 pounds and features four seniors.

Washington State also features its own version of the Fab Five with senior receivers Tims, Shawn McWashington, Kevin McKenzie, Chris Jackson, brother of Ray, and junior Nian Taylor.

McWashington and McKenzie share the team lead with 16 receptions each, while McKenzie and Taylor have each caught four touchdown passes.

"I just always want to be on the field," he says. "Plus, there are not a lot of receivers who can't do all three things: catch, return punts and return kick-offs."

Separating himself from other receivers is important to Johnson. He says that is the only way he will be able to get people to look at him as an all-around quality player instead of just the "fast guy."

"If I was with nine other wide receivers," Johnson says, "and we all were thrown 10 passes and we all dropped one, I think I would stand out."

If Johnson thinks that is how he is viewed by the coaches and players on his team, though, he might be selling them short.

"I threw up a couple of balls that I couldn't believe he caught," Maas says. "He has developed such great hands. He is also very strong and has the ability to make people miss. He is the total package."
