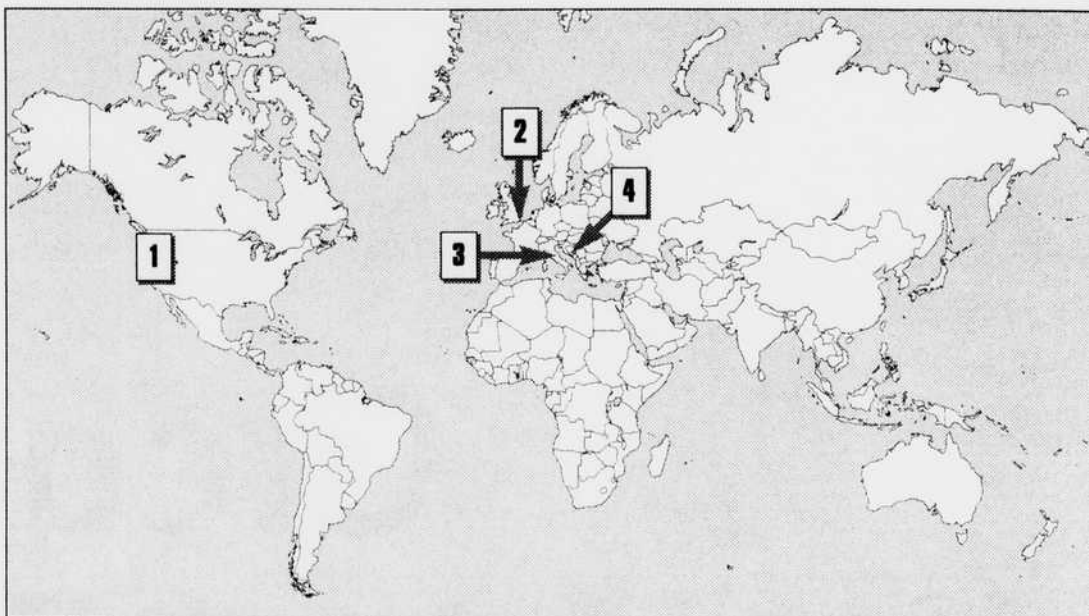

HIV-positive man faces murder charges

1 McMinnville — A man accused of sexually abusing two boys and a mentally handicapped teenager despite knowing he had AIDS is facing additional charges.

Andrew Lee Boyer of Newberg was arraigned Friday in Yamhill County Circuit Court. He is being held at the county jail on \$750,000 bail.

Boyer, 35, is now charged with abusing a 14-year-old boy and attempting to murder the mentally handicapped teen by forcing the 18-year-old to have sex with him when Boyer knew he was infected with the AIDS virus.

Boyer previously was charged with one count of attempted aggravated murder, one count of attempted murder, five counts of first-degree sodomy, four counts of second-degree sodomy and nine counts of first-degree sexual abuse.

His trial is scheduled for Dec. 2.

Harrods withdraws Diana's biography

2 LONDON — The controversial Andrew Morton biography of Princess Diana was withdrawn from sale at Harrods department store on orders from its owner, Mohamed Al Fayed, whose son died with the princess five weeks ago.

The book, in which Morton says Diana was the main source for the painful details of her early life and marriage to Prince Charles, was due for widespread publication Monday.

A few London stores put several hundred copies of *Diana, Her True Story — In Her Own Words* on sale Saturday. Dillons said it sold all 4,000 of the books it made available at five central outlets.

U.S. peace envoy may regulate Serb media

4 PALE, Bosnia-Herzegovina — The U.S. envoy to Bosnia proposed Sunday that mediators regulate local media, formalizing foreign control of broadcasting in the Serb-ruled half of the country.

Last week, troops of the NATO-led peace force seized four transmitters broadcasting signals from Bosnian Serb state television based in Pale, the stronghold of wartime leader Radovan Karadzic and his supporters.

The peace force ensured that the broadcast signal was switched to the television in Banja Luka, loyal to Bosnian Serb President Biljana Plavsic, who is locked in a leadership struggle with Karadzic.

Robert Gelbard, the chief U.S. envoy to Bosnia, told reporters that the Pale studio had continually broadcast "threats ... lies and distortions" about the interna-

tional organizations enforcing the 1995 Dayton peace accord.

The Pale broadcasts were silenced on Wednesday after a voiced-over broadcast twisted the message of Louise Arbour, the chief prosecutor of the U.N. war crimes tribunal. The broadcast distorted her message to suggest the Hague, Netherlands-based tribunal was anti-Serb. An earlier broadcast likened the peace force to Nazi storm troopers.

Italy rests on shaky ground after quakes

3 ROME — Tremors continued to shake central Italy as prefabricated housing arrived Sunday to house some of the thousands left homeless by a pair of strong earthquakes on Sept. 26.

There were no reports of new damage or injuries from a series of mild aftershocks reported throughout the day. There have been hundreds of aftershocks since the two big quakes.

The ANSA news agency reported that prefabricated housing for some of the homeless began arriving Sunday in the Umbria region, where several medieval towns were devastated by the quakes.

The quakes killed 10 people, and several frescoes in the renowned Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi were destroyed.
