REL 202 Great Religions: Christianity, Judaism, and Islam (4 credits)

Instructor: Joan Pierson

Description: This course surveys the beliefs, practices, and institutions of the three major Western religions: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam as they are expressed in history and contemporary culture.

HIST 399 The Holocaust in History (4 credits)

Description: Students will explore the Holocaust in relation to (among other things) the history of European anti-Semitism; to structures and functions of the Nazi state; to German public opinion during the 1930s and 1940s; and to the unfolding of global war from 1939 on. The course will conclude with readings in several post-war controversies surrounding conflicting historical representations of the Holocaust.

This overview of Oregon Archaeology is presented by the research faculty of the UO Museum of Natural History, based on their current work throughout the state.
