Man exposes himself to female student

1 A female student was the victim of public indecency Oct. 14 at 10:03 p.m. in the University Education building at 961 E. 18th Street.

According to the police report, the victim was sitting at a desk with her back to a window in a classroom when the male subject knocked on the window. The victim, thinking someone wanted access to the building, turned around to face the window and saw the suspect with his pants down and genitals exposed.

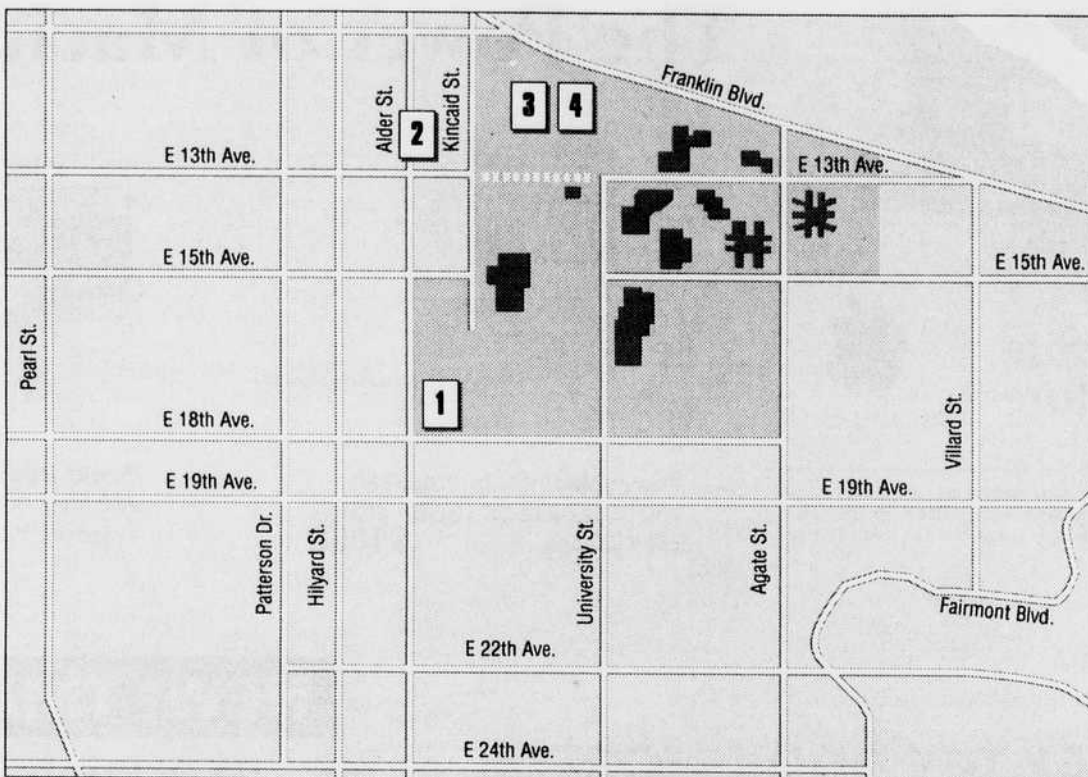
The victim then called the University Office of Public Safety. She told officers that she could probably recognize the suspect if she saw his face again, but was scared to see him face-to-face.

The police have a suspect but have not filed charges. The incident is still under investigation.

Street brawl ends in woman's arrest

2 On Oct. 17 at about 10:30 p.m., a Eugene police officer spotted two people rolling on the ground at 1261 Alder St.

As the first officer and two other officers approached, he saw a



woman on top of a man, screaming at him and hitting him in the face. The two separated when the officers made verbal contact.

When the officers attempted to calm the female down, she began

hitting the male again.

The female was then arrested.

The woman claimed the man had abused and raped her and had addicted her to drugs. She also said he was associated with

the Mexican Mafia.

The female was charged with kidnap and assault and lodged at Lane County Jail. The male is on state probation for assault and has several previous arrests for

assault and menacing.

The incident is still under investigation.

Senate gives funding to three groups

The Student Senate allocated \$4,500 to the Designated Driver Shuttle Wednesday. The group will use the money — \$3,700 of which was given as a loan — to buy a new van that was formerly used by the Forest Service.

The Senate had tabled the discussion and several requests last week.

The Senate will hold the DDS computer as collateral until \$2,145 of the loan is paid. DDS has begun fund raising and already has verbal commitments of

support from four bars, according to Brandon Smith, DDS public relations director.

The service has requested money from the Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Council, as well as individual chapters, director Ryan Ositis said. The shuttle will also petition the Residence Hall Governance Committee and will hold a silent auction.

The Senate also voted to allocate the Student Bar Association \$4,000 for a \$25,000 two-day symposium on sustainable business planned for Nov. 10 through

12. The association has raised \$20,000 from businesses.

Dance Oregon also applied for Senate funds, but the Senate refused to hear the group because it failed to turn in a budget last year. The group needed 14 votes to be heard and only received 11. The Senate's refusal to hear them was a punishment, according to Senator Jenna Wasson.

Dance Oregon could still return for special request funds for specific events.

The Senate also allocated the Vietnamese Student Association \$100.
