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Moseley: Series won't be forgotten

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As the game has done so many times in the past, making goats out of superstars such as Jose Canseco and heroes out of non-names such as Mookie Wilson, it did not hold to form. Mesa surrendered two quick hits, at which point Counsell delivered the biggest sacrifice fly of his life, tying the game at 2 in the bottom of the ninth.

At that point the viewer began to realize what was unfolding: potentially one of the greatest Series games ever.

It would be hard to match the adrenaline rush produced by Marlin closer Robb Nen in the 10th, when he struck out Omar Vizquel to open the inning, gave up a single to Fernandez and then fanned Manny Ramirez and David Justice, Cleveland's three and four hitters, to end the inning.

Charles Nagy, whom Indian manager Mike Hargrove by-

passed in favor of Wright for the start, replaced Mesa with two outs in the bottom of the 10th and retired the side, but disaster struck him in the 11th.

Bonilla led off the inning with a single. With one out, Counsell hit a sharp ground ball to second. Bonilla hesitated on his way to second to avoid the ball, a move which possibly distracted second baseman and former hero Fernandez, who took his eye off the ball long enough to let it roll under his glove and into the outfield, allowing Bonilla to reach third.

After an intentional walk to load the bases, Devon White hit a fielder's choice to Fernandez who, instead of trying to double up the speedy White, made the smart play and got Bonilla at home.

But Renteria, a 21-year-old shortstop, stepped up to the plate with the bases loaded and two out in the bottom of the 11th inning of the seventh game of the

World Series and ensured Fernandez's place in infamy. He lined a single into center to give Florida a championship just five years after the team's inception and three years quicker than the Mets, who won in 1969 after only eight years in existence.

Had this game been played in June, it would have gone virtually unnoticed. Extra-inning games are played almost every night of the regular season.

But the pageantry produced by the World Series, the performances in the clutch by players such as Wright and Counsell, who weren't on their teams to begin this season, and the perseverance of Bonilla, Leyland and Darren Daulton, who failed so much in the last few years before finally winning it this year, were enough to make this one of the most memorable games in baseball history.

Oregon hockey drops three over weekend

Last weekend's trip to California was not a pleasant one for the Oregon Club Sports hockey team. Two losses to Southern California and one to UCLA dropped the Ducks' record to 2-3.

The Trojans jumped on the Ducks from the get-go Friday night, on their way to a 6-3 win. At the end of the first period, Oregon trailed 3-0 before mounting an insufficient comeback. However, the defeat wasn't the only loss the Ducks suffered in the game. First-line defenseman Jor-

dan Weiner was knocked out of the game with a dislocated shoulder that is expected to keep him sidelined for a month.

"Friday we came out flat," said head coach Geoff Norman. "USC got up 3-0, and we never regrouped."

On Saturday night against UCLA, the Ducks played much better, according to Norman, but came up on the downside of a 6-3 final score. Norman estimated that the Ducks outshot the Bruins by a 2-1 ratio, but his team simply could not find the back of the net with enough regularity to gain a win.

"We started out flat again," Norman said. "We couldn't buy a goal. We definitely outplayed them but just didn't get the breaks."

After the Saturday night game, the Ducks had an early Sunday morning rematch with the Trojans. Oregon's exhaustion showed as it was pummeled by the Trojans, 12-3.

"We were tired, and everybody had knocks and minor injuries," said Norman. "Defensively we played horrible. They were mistakes that are very correctable."

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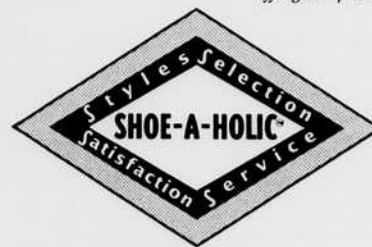
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
