"I'm kept very busy with landlord-tenant issues, but I'm still very busy with less than one-third of the people on campus," he said.
Davidson, who is a proponent of a renter's guide with a rating system, said he favors the new housing code and hopes the City Council will pass it.
In an Oct. 31 meeting chaired by ASUO President Bill Miner concerning a renter's guide, Davidson suggested that the ranking system be done on a scale of one to ten. The ranking should be done on a numeric scale so as to

limit the liability of the ASUO. A ranking system would not allow tenants to libel certain rental companies or landlords they have had difficulty with.
This is not the first time, however, a ranking system has been tried by a group at the University. When current City Councilman Bobby Lee was president of the ASUO five years ago, he tried to garner support for a similar ranking system. Miner said the plan ultimately failed because of stiff opposition from rental companies.
According to Miner, the current attempt at a ranking system would be completely under the

control of the ASUO, which would tackle the legal implications if they should occur.
Miner argued the new system of ranking would heighten the awareness of students and allow them to formally evaluate housing.
"Unless we can get a formal survey, we cannot get the attention of the students," he said. "We're paying astronomical amounts for substandard living."
Miner said he wants to print the ranking system by the spring 1998, and he hopes to receive incidental funding from the ASUO Student Senate to finance the pamphlet.

Fees: Technology fee stays the same

Recreation/Fitness Center Bond Fee. Voted in by students last year, the bond will cost students \$15.25 per term to cover the costs for construction and maintenance of the recreation facility.
The only fee that did not increase was the technology fee. Staying at \$50 per term, this fee covers the cost of computers and equipment and the use of e-mail. However, students can expect for an increase in the technology fee for next year's budget, Miner said.

"[Legislatures] want to increase it 150 percent fold because of more demand for Internet use," he said. "[The ASUO] is going to try to stop that, too."
Miner said he'd like to see a freeze of all fees except the fees that are student-controlled.
The instruction fee freeze was a big accomplishment for the ASUO and the OSA, Miner said.
"We showed OSSHE, the state and the nation that students can be organized and know what they're talking about," he said.

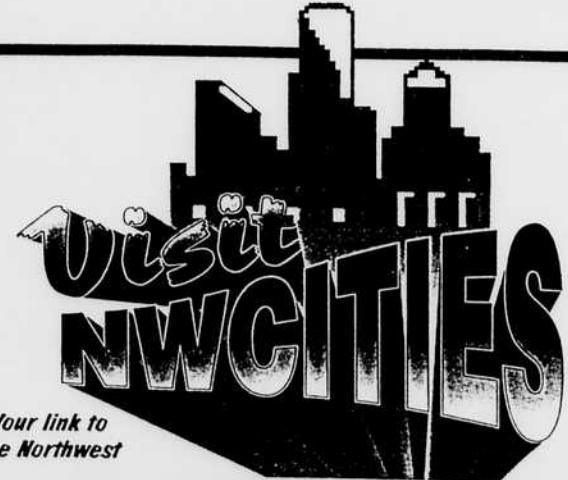
