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nose tackle.

"He was quite impressive from the first time we competed against him," Oregon offensive line coach Neal Zoumboukos says. "This has been a good football player since day one."

Breckterfield had his coming-out party during his second season in Corvallis and was awarded honorable mention Pac-10 merit for finishing sixth in the Pac-10 in tackles for loss with 16 and tied for 17th in tackles.

Despite his small stature, Breckterfield succeeds in one of the nation's toughest football conferences, sometimes on will alone.

"He's probably the most intense player we've faced all year," Zoumboukos says. "His motor seems to run at another level, and you have to come prepared to deal with that. If you're not, he's going to make you look foolish."

Oregon State defensive line coach Michael Gray says Breckterfield's work ethic translates into a high-intensity level.

"His intensity level is pretty high because he works on that every day in practice," Gray says. "He's one of those guys that works hard all the time, and I think that kind of sharpens his edge."

This season, coming into which he garnered honorable mention All-American status by Street & Smith magazine, Breckterfield has extended his consecutive-games-started streak to 27 and says the 28th could be the most important.

"We need this win," he says. "Personally, I'm not a native of Oregon, so my rivalry is the fact that they beat us two years in a row. I don't like getting beat and this win will help jumpstart the program into 1998."

For a program that is 6-26 in his three years, Breckterfield is sure to do all he can to help jumpstart it into the contender he had hoped to join when he was recruited.

Although that hasn't worked out, he has kept the experience in perspective.

"The win-loss record hasn't been too good," Breckterfield says, "but the experience overall has been good."

Pac-10: Hicks on track to break more records

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only seven games, passed McCullough with a 98-yard performance last weekend.

The Oregon senior is now averaging 103.7 yards per game, Canidate 106 yards and Shehee 107.8 yards.

Shehee is expected to play against Washington State this Saturday.

With meaning

And you thought it was a big deal when Oregon went to the Rose Bowl?

The Washington State Cougars will be playing for their first trip to the Rose Bowl since 1931 when they face Washington in the Apple Cup in Seattle.

Saturday's matchup marks the first time since 1981 that the Apple Cup has had Rose Bowl implications for the Cougars.

Since 1962, Washington is 25-10 against Washington State. The last time Washington State won in Seattle was in 1985.

The Apple Cup is one of four rival matchups this Saturday in the Pac-10. California and Stanford play the 100th Big Game at Stanford Stadium, Oregon and Oregon State play the 101st Civil War matchup, and UCLA and USC

square off in the battle of Los Angeles.

The Stanford and California rivalry is the oldest on the West Coast, dating back to 1892, but the Oregon-Oregon State is the longest, with 100 games played between the two since 1894.

In the zone

UCLA tailback Skip Hicks may as well move into the end zone.

The senior broke the 29-year-old conference record for touchdowns in a single season last Saturday against Washington when he scored four touchdowns to bring his season-total to 24.

Hicks broke the record set by O.J. Simpson in 1968 and tied by USC's Marcus Allen and Corey Dillon of Washington last season.

His 53 career touchdowns ties him for the career mark set by USC's Charles White from 1976-79, and his 21 rushing touchdowns this season is one short of the single-season mark.

Washington State quarterback Ryan Leaf has been just as productive as Hicks, but through the air.

The junior has tied the single-season conference record of 31 touchdown passes set by California's Pat Barnes last season, and his 56 career touchdowns is seventh all-time in the conference.
