Rugby looks for upset of Beavers

The Oregon Club Sports rugby team has not defeated Oregon State in nine years

The Oregon Club Sports rugby team plays its version of the Civil War on Saturday, just as its football counterpart does. The Ducks take on Oregon State at 10:30 a.m. at South Bank Field.

"It should be a bloodbath," Oregon forward Cal Taylor said.

Oregon is 4-0 this season and is riding the momentum of a six-game winning streak dating back to last season. The Ducks have outscored their last two opponents, Portland and Lewis & Clark, by a combined score of 120-0.

Oregon will need every bit of that momentum to upend the Beavers, who enter Saturday's match 6-0 and ranked No. 8 in the country. The Ducks also have another staggering number working against them — they haven't defeated Oregon State in nine years.

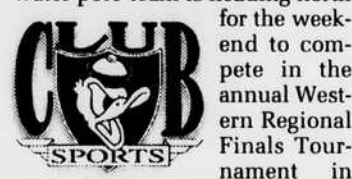
"I think this is the team that can do it," Alex Sroka said.

Taylor said a key to the match could be the play of the Oregon forwards. Taylor, Eric East, Matt Sheetz and Saman Ancona must have brilliant showings for the

Ducks to come out on top, he said. "We're going in with a lot of confidence," Taylor said. "We have the best team we've had in years. The keys for us are to not be intimidated and to be ready to play."

Oregon to compete in Western Regionals

The Oregon Club Sports men's water polo team is heading north



for the week-end to compete in the annual Western Regional Finals Tournament in

Federal Way, Wash. Oregon is set to face Western Washington and the University of Victoria in opening play on Saturday. The Ducks are coming off a 2-2 showing at the Arizona Tournament Halloween weekend.

"This is the strongest season we've had in a long time despite what our record has shown," head coach Scott McCarty said.

The Ducks must win their first two games to advance to the second round, which is held on Sunday. With a pair of wins, Oregon will face either Utah State or Sacramento State on Sunday.

The double-elimination tournament features 19 teams from all over the West Coast.

"Our goal is to place in the top four overall," McCarty said.

Oregon played five of the 19 teams that will be at the championships in an October tournament also held at Federal Way. The Ducks compiled a 2-3 showing by beating Washington State 9-8 and Oregon State 15-12.

Sailing team sends 3 to Sloop Nationals

The Oregon Club Sports sailing team is sending three members to compete in the Sloop Nationals this weekend at Balboa Yacht Club in Newport Beach, Calif.

Joe Penrod, Peter McCormick and Violet Barnard will compete for the Ducks against teams from Notre Dame, Michigan, Hawaii, the College of Charleston, host California-Irvine and four other schools.

"I think we're going to shock them," Penrod said. "They won't know what's coming because they give the Northwest no respect."

Oregon qualified for the tournament by winning elimination tournaments in the Pacific Northwest last spring.

Two top quarterbacks go head to head

Ryan Leaf of No. 11 Washington State and Brock Huard of No. 17 Washington have battled at the top of the NCAA's passing charts

SPOKANE, Wash. — Quarterbacks Ryan Leaf and Brock Huard are the oil and vinegar in this weekend's Apple Cup salad.

Leaf, of No. 11 Washington State, is the brash leader of one of the nation's top offenses, adept at flinging touchdown passes, opposing linemen and barbs.

Huard, of 17th-ranked Washington, is a smooth drop-back passer with deadly accuracy. But he's a poor source of bulletin-board material for opposing teams.

The two have battled at the top of the NCAA's passing charts every week. Saturday they will face each other in Seattle in the 89th edition of this bitter football rivalry. And for the first time since 1981, a Rose Bowl berth is at stake for WSU.

"I respect Brock," Leaf said this week. "I wish him luck in everything he does, but not that much luck this weekend."

Luck has little to do with it.

Leaf and Huard are the latest products of two quarterback factories that have produced the likes of Warren Moon and Mark Brunell at UW and Drew Bledsoe and Mark Rypien at WSU.

Both are listed at 6-foot-5 and both have been lighting up opposing defenses.

Leaf has already thrown a Pacific-10 Conference record 31 touchdown passes and a WSU record 3,279 yards this season. The Cougars are 14-8 in his career starts, and he has thrown for more than 200 yards in all but two.

Huard has thrown for 1,857 yards and 19 touchdowns with just five interceptions this season. The Huskies are 14-2 in his career starts.

Leaf was rated the third-best college quarterback in the nation after last week's games. Huard was ranked fourth.

The two have had contact only once, in last year's Apple Cup, when Huard's touchdown pass in overtime lifted Washington to a 31-24 victory in Pullman. That was after Leaf passed for 218 yards in the fourth quarter to tie the game at 24-24.

Leaf has promised to stay away from trash talk about the Huskies. Earlier this season, he caused a furor when he said he wasn't particularly interested in meeting Huard and correctly predicted that UCLA would beat Washington.

"I've always been like this," Leaf said Tuesday. "You can't go onto a football field and look across the line like the person across from you is better."

"I've just been overly competitive," said Leaf, from Great Falls, Mont. "Sometimes it was probably a disadvantage."

Last season, he threw a football at a reporter's head because he was upset by an article. Leaf said he missed deliberately. Perhaps the most telling image from this season is his flinging would-be sackers to the turf before completing yet another touchdown bomb.

Huard, a sophomore, doesn't generate nearly the attention Leaf does, but he has his share of admirers.

"Brock Huard can throw with anyone in the league," WSU coach Mike Price says.

"He's the best I've seen in college in a long, long time," Seattle Seahawks coach Dennis Erickson said before the season.

A pre-med major from Puyallup, Wash., Huard is deeply religious and buries his competitiveness behind a level-headed persona.

He is the younger brother of Damon Huard, Washington's all-time career passing leader and now the No. 3 quarterback with the Miami Dolphins, and older brother of Luke Huard, who has signed to play at North Carolina.

If you're looking for bluster, look elsewhere.

Before this year's widely publicized game with Nebraska, which Washington lost, Huard said: "My objective Saturday is to glorify God, and glorify my teammates. It's not to glorify myself."

After Arizona's Chester Burnett was injured in the game against Washington, Huard went to the sideline to say a prayer for him.

Huard has been slowed this year by an ankle injury suffered against Nebraska. But he's been the nation's top-rated passer on several weeks.

He insists that credit goes to the rest of the offense.

"There's one tight end, one tailback, five linemen," he has said. "I'd love them to dominate every game, to dominate up front, be able to run the ball."

Huard insists that many of his friends are Cougars and does not have any vitriol to heap on his foes.

"Friends in the family say they will not root for me in that game," Huard said. "It's a pretty neat rivalry."

This may be the last time the two face each other in college.

Leaf is deciding whether to return for a senior season. He says he will make his decision before the Cougars' expected bowl game, but will not announce it until after the game.

"I don't think I'm as polished as a lot of other quarterbacks in this country," Leaf said, though analysts say he'd likely be the first or second quarterback taken in this year's NFL draft.
