Final game couldn't have been better for Koetter

LAS VEGAS — For an offensive coordinator coaching his last Oregon game, the scene couldn't have been scripted any better.

Dirk Koetter, who had recently accepted head coaching duties at Boise State, had just completed a masterpiece by any stretch of the imagination.

His Oregon offense had sent statisticians scrambling to figure out how many records his offense had just set and the Air Force defense wondering what hit them.

It looked as if the Ducks were competing against a defense straight out of the Las Vegas Pop Warner league.

Head coach Mike Bellotti and the players celebrated at midfield following the Ducks' 41-13 thrashing of No. 23 Air Force at Sam Boyd Stadium, but Koetter was nowhere near the celebration.

The second-year coordinator was watching from 20 yards away, his hair, which usually looked as if it was finely groomed by a stylist, was jutting around in all directions as he stopped and watched the celebration with a smile and a look of accomplishment on his face.

There was no one to share the moment with, but that was the way Koetter wanted it.

His eyes were watching Bellotti and the players celebrate, but his mind was recalling two glorious years for the Oregon offense, years in which more records fell than some knew existed.

"Tonight I just wanted to stand back and look at it," Koetter said as his eyes began to well.

It was a wonderful ride for Koetter, who came to Eugene from Boston College, where he spent two seasons as the quarterbacks coach.

It's hard to imagine what else he could have accomplished.

The offense thrived under his direction, setting single-season records for passing yards, touchdowns, total offense and first downs in his first season in 1996.

In 1997, he helped guide the Ducks' balanced attack that led to their first conference rushing champion (Saladin McCullough) since 1971 and successfully —

more times than not — switched Akili Smith and Jason Maas at quarterback.

As much as he enjoyed the success he had and the people he worked with, Koetter's time had come.

It was his turn to take a head coaching position.

"It's hard to leave behind some really good people, but it's time for the next challenge in my life," he said shortly after the Las Vegas Bowl victory on Dec. 20.

There's only 108 of those positions in the nation, Koetter noted, and he'd been offered a head coaching position before, but now was the time.

He returns to his native Idaho, where he grew up in Pocatello, in an attempt to lead Boise State, which was 4-7 in 1997, to the success it has yet to find in Division I-A.

Much of Koetter's family still resides in Idaho, including the other coaches of the family, his brother and father.

He will not, however, soon forget his two seasons in Eugene.

"We had tremendous offensive talent, and I was there to reap the rewards," he said. "We had some excellent players and some excellent coaches. And a head coach, I've said this before, Mike's an offensive coordinator's dream because Mike gives you a license to kill."

Oregon athletic director Bill Moos made his rounds through the Oregon locker room following the bowl game win and finally reached Koetter, who was standing with reporters just outside the locker room.

He patted Koetter on the back and said with a smile: "Remind me never to schedule Boise State."

Koetter laughed appreciatively and after Moos had left, turned to reporters and said, "That's the hard part."
