OREGON 66, CALIFORNIA 59

Oregon rolls in opener

Led by Terik Brown's 18 points, the Ducks won their league opener Saturday against the Bears 66-59

In a battle of two teams predicted to occupy the bottom half of the Pacific-10 Conference standings this season, Oregon easily handled California to win its league opener 66-59 Saturday night at McArthur Court before a crowd of 6,414.

Guard Terik Brown led the Ducks with 18 points, Henry Madden had 13 and Oregon scored a season-high 10 three-pointers, four by Brown, while shooting a season-best 47 percent from beyond the arc.

The Ducks (1-0 Pac-10, 6-4 overall) played 40 minutes of stifling defense, forcing the Golden Bears (0-1, 4-5) into 22 turnovers — a season high for Oregon — and allowed only one California player, Geno Carlisle, to score in double figures with 28 points.

Oregon also out-rebounded California 30-28 despite size mismatches under the basket, led by A.D. Smith's career-high eight boards.

"Coach said most of our games are going to be won on the defensive end," said point guard Mike McShane, who tied his season-high with seven assists while committing only one turnover. "We were talking and switching up real well; it seemed like when they passed, we were right there when they caught the ball."

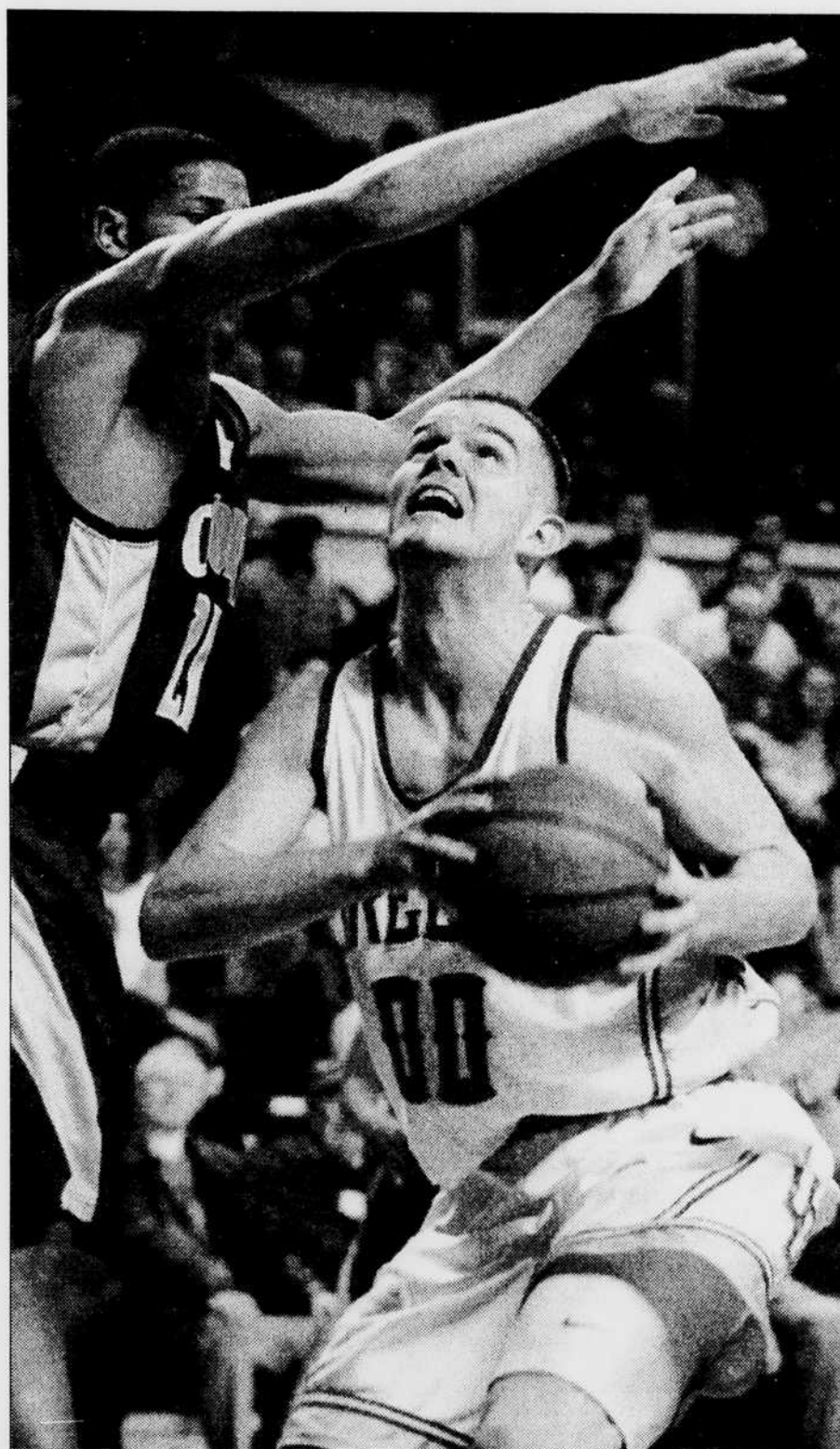
Oregon trailed only once, when California made the first basket of the game, and shot 50 percent from the field in the first half to go up by 12 points, 35-23, at the break.

California looked like it was going to take some momentum into the locker room when it went on a 7-0 run in the final two minutes of the first half and cut Oregon's lead from 16 to nine.

But the Golden Bears lost the ball out of bounds trying to run out the clock and McShane fielded the inbound's pass with two seconds remaining and sank a three-point shot at the buzzer to take some of the life out of California's rally.

"It was huge," said Oregon head coach Ernie Kent about McShane's basket. "We broke down on their last two or three possessions, but it gave us momentum going

Mowe-less Ducks fall to the Cardinal

Stanford rolled to a 97-72 win after the Ducks got into foul trouble early in the second half

The Stanford Cardinal entered the Pacific-10 Conference season with a very un-Stanford like 3-4 record, but after the opening weekend of the conference season, there is no mistaking the fact that the Cardinal is as strong as ever.

Led by Olympia Scott's monster performance of 25 points and 16 rebounds, the Cardinal ran away from the Oregon women in the second half for a 97-72 win in front of 4,816 at Maples Pavilion.

The win pushes the Cardinal's home-court winning streak to 58 and its Pac-10 winning streak to 47, dating back to Feb. 9, 1995. The win also gave the Cardinal its 21st straight over Oregon, a streak that dates back to 1987.

Oregon, starting two true freshmen and a sophomore, stayed with No. 15 Stanford (5-4 overall, 2-0 Pac-10) through the first half, never falling behind by more than 10 points and leading the Cardinal by one with less than eight minutes to play in the half.

"We played well for about 18 minutes, and we didn't play well after that," Oregon head coach Jody Runge said.

After Oregon (5-5, 1-1) held that brief one-point lead, Stanford went on a 10-2 run to lead 33-26 with four minutes, 11 seconds left in the half and pushed its lead to 10 points in the final minute of the half.

Brianne Meharry hit a three-pointer with one second to play in the half to cut the Cardinal lead to 46-39, but after the half, it was all Stanford.

The two teams traded baskets to start the second half, but Scott's layup less than five minutes into the half gave Stanford a double-digit lead that never got below 10 points the rest of the way.

Starting at the 16:35 mark, the Ducks didn't convert a field-goal attempt for more than five minutes as Stanford pushed its lead to 14.

From there, the Cardinal's lead only got bigger as it used its fastbreak game and frontcourt play to lead by as many as 28 points, 90-62, with less than four minutes to play.

Down the stretch, it was the Ducks' foul

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
