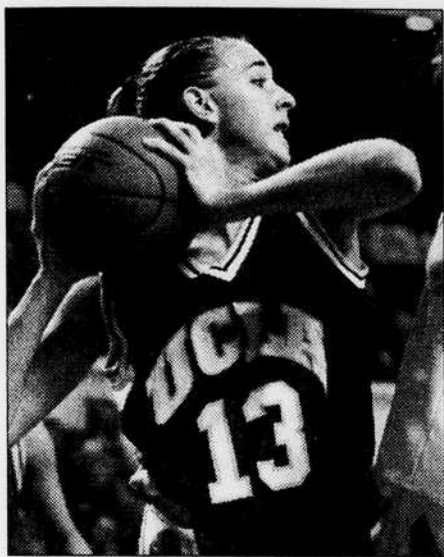

Sophomore forward seals Oregon's fate

UCLA's Maylana Martin scored 10 of her game-high 27 points in the final seven minutes

UCLA head coach Kathy Olivier briefly interrupted Maylana Martin's postgame meeting with reporters following the Bruins' 80-75 win over the Ducks Saturday afternoon.

"Go to, baby. Go to," Olivier shouted as she exchanged a high-five with her 6-foot-3 sophomore forward before gleefully moving on.

Martin was the Bruins' go-to player down the stretch, and she responded by scoring 10 points in the final six minutes, 51 seconds as

Oregon missed 18 out of 33 attempts to shoot 45.5 percent from the foul line in its 80-75 loss to UCLA

What's so free about free throws anyway? The Oregon women may be asking themselves that very question after missing 18 attempts from the line in their 80-75 loss to UCLA at McArthur Court on Saturday afternoon.

"We just didn't make free throws. That's all there really is to say about it," Oregon head coach Jody Runge said.

The Ducks had their chances late in the game, fighting back from a 12-point deficit early in the second half to tie the game at 62 with eight minutes, 14 seconds to play.

But after the tie, Oregon made just five of 10 free-throw attempts as the Bruins built their lead to as many as seven points in the final eight minutes.

The win was only the Bruins' second in the last 10 meetings between the two teams and improves their record to 8-5 overall and 3-1 in Pacific-10 Conference play. Oregon drops to 6-6 overall and 2-2 in the Pac-10.

"The difference in the game is that we didn't make free throws," said Runge, who missed her postgame live radio interview and left reporters waiting for 50 minutes. "I think that's been the difference in every game we haven't won, and we need to get that squared away. I'm not sure how that's going to happen except for this team taking personal responsibility to make sure that they do that."

A crowd of 4,015 — the 15th largest crowd ever for an Oregon women's game at Mac Court — saw the Ducks shoot 45.5

Ducks almost pull off upset in Los Angeles

Oregon fell two points short of upsetting No. 10 UCLA after the Bruins squandered a 20-point lead

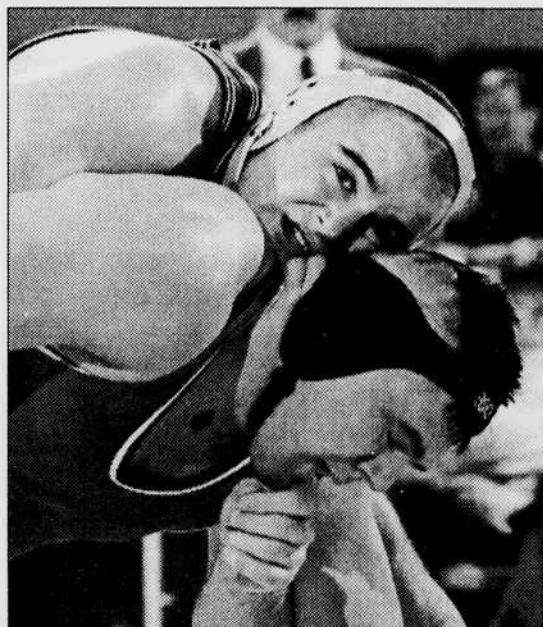

For anyone who turned off the television midway through the first half of Saturday night's Oregon-UCLA men's basketball game — too bad for you.

The Ducks, showing tremendous resolve, came back from deficits of 16-0, 23-3 and 47-28 to take a three-point lead with 4:52 remaining in the game, before eventually losing by two, 68-66 to the 10th-ranked Bruins in front of 11,713 at Pauley Pavilion in Los Angeles.

With 25 seconds on the clock and the game tied at 66, UCLA's true freshman Baron Davis stole the ball from Yasir Rosemond, passed it ahead to Earl Watson, who
