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Group calls for new housing code

Concerned students gathered to discuss a proposed housing code

A newly formed group of ASUO, student and community representatives discussed ways to get a draft of a housing code passed through the City Council at a meeting Friday afternoon. But as the group considers how to pass the code, the University and many property owners are expressing opposition to its passage.

The meeting marked the first such gathering of concerned University students who want to set habitability standards for city housing and give renters more leverage in rental disputes with property owners.

The proposed housing code was drafted by the City Council-directed Department Advisory Committee in June 1995. The scope of the code was expanded to adopt most of the state housing code on an interim basis in July 1996.



The council reviewed a completed draft of the code on Nov. 10, but has not taken any further action since that time. The city used to have a housing code in place that set minimum standards for tenant habitability, but the code was eliminated in 1983 because of budget reductions. Currently, the city has no way to enforce the state housing code without a city code in place.

"I have a general feeling right now that it's not in the best interests of Councilor [Bobby] Lee to bring it up," ASUO President Bill Miner said at Friday's meeting.

In a separate interview, Lee said he does not want to set a council agenda for additional discussion of the code until University housing representatives, the ASUO and students target and define specific items they want included in a housing code.

Currently, University Housing is against the proposed housing code because of the additional cost it would place on student renters.

As of Friday's meeting, Miner said the ASUO had not attempted to contact University Housing representatives to consolidate their stance on the housing code.

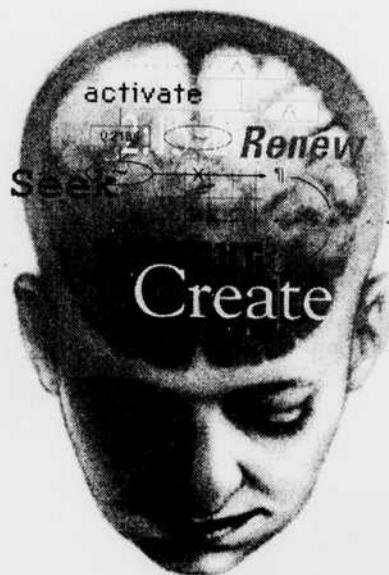

"At this point in time, the University administrators are against the housing code," Lee said. "The University administration, the ASUO and property management representatives need to come together and develop one plan."

Lee suggested that a discussion of the code should lead to a new committee that would define what all entities want out of a housing code.
