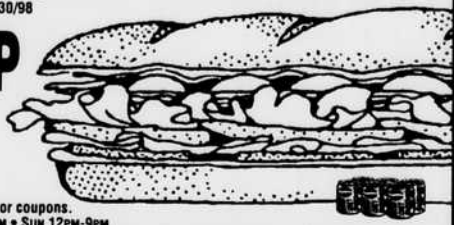

Stanford up first for men, women

The Cardinal's men's tennis team is ranked No. 1 in the nation

So much for easing into conference play.

The Oregon men's and women's tennis teams will get thrown directly into the fire when they begin Pacific-10 Conference play today against Stanford. The Cardinal is the defending national champion in both men's and women's tennis, with the men ranked No. 1 in the country and the women ranked fifth.

The women will challenge No. 7-ranked California at noon on Sunday at Willow Creek Racquet Club. After playing in Palo Alto, the men will travel to Berkeley to face the Golden Bears on Saturday.

On the women's side, Stanford is competing in Eugene for the first time ever at 1:30 p.m. today at Willow Creek, an indoor club. The newly formatted Pac-10 provides the Ducks with the opportunity to play spoiler at home. However, Oregon captain Alison Sosnow said she does not expect the new surroundings to affect the play of the Cardinal or Bears.

"Both Stanford and Berkeley have very experienced players that travel and play everywhere," Sosnow said. "They're used to indoor facilities."

Stanford head coach Frank Brennan said he is eager to see how his team handles playing indoors.

"It's a little different indoors," Brennan said. "But I'm not adverse to coming to Eugene."

Oregon head coach Jack Griffin said his line-up is set, but his No. 2-4 singles players are interchangeable.

For singles, Alina Wygonowska is No. 1, and Allison Sosnow, Andrea Petrovic and Sarah Colistro are in the two through four slots. Shanelle Kaneshiro starts at No. 5, and Jaime Martin is No. 6.

In doubles, Sosnow/Kaneshiro is No. 1, Petrovic/Wygonowska is second and Colistro/Martin is third.

Griffin said the Ducks must play their game and not allow the high rankings of their opponents affect their tactics.

"They're both in the top seven in the country," Griffin said. "And

what I'm trying to stress to the players is to not get the mind-set that we need to come up with spectacular shots to beat them, that we have to do something we're not capable of. Our strategy is to play our game and go out there and fight our butts off."

These are the first team matches for the Ducks this year, although they are coming off a strong showing at the Indoor Pac-10 Tennis Championships in Seattle.

In Palo Alto, the Oregon men's tennis team will also be shooting to knock some of the luster off defending national champion Stanford's throne. The Ducks will then try to beat California for the first time ever. The Bears are 13-0 against Oregon all time.

"I want to see our guys go out there and make them play a close set, so that it will come down to who is making the right decision at crunch time," said Oregon head coach Chris Russell.

In singles, Erwan Kergroach, Guillermo Carter, Carlos Navarro, Joaquin Hamdan, Miguel Arriaga and Jeff Thomsen are seeded in that order.

For doubles play, Kergroach/Carter is No. 1, Thomsen/Arriaga No. 2 and Navarro/Hamdan No. 3.

foot-6 sensation is third in the Pacific-10 Conference in both scoring, with 19 points per game, and steals, with more than two per contest.

"He has done a tremendous job with his ability to carry that team and score the basketball," Kent said.

But the Beavers are not a one-man team.

Despite losing guard Ron Grady for the season because of a lacerated kidney, the Beavers have a strong supporting cast, led by guard John-Blair Bickerstaff and 6-6 center Terrill Woods, a 280-pounder who certainly makes up in weight what he lacks in height.

"He does the little things that nobody really notices," Madden

said of Woods.

Oregon's Flo Hartenstein, the Ducks' most consistent player in Arizona, will be going against Woods most of the night in what should be an intriguing matchup between the two big men.

Hartenstein, (6-9, 255) had a career-high 12 points in the Ducks' loss to Arizona State and added five steals.

The Ducks need to regain their shooting touch after two sub-par offensive games while in Arizona. They shot just 31 percent against the Wildcats and 36.7 percent against the Sun Devils.

Part of the problem is that as Madden and teammate Terik Brown go, so does the Duck of-

fense. The team's two leading scorers combined to score 25 points in the two losses, going a combined 11 for 37 from the field, including one for 16 from the three-point line.

"We really did not perform well or play well, and we need to get back going again," Kent said. "And there is no better place to do it than back at home with our crowd and our people."

Kent said that getting a win against Oregon State could spill over into next week's series against UCLA and Southern California.

"With three straight games at home, this could really set the table for each," he said.

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
