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changed from 70 to 155 watts in order to improve the lighting in the area, said Keith Cooper, an electric shop employee.

The plan was adopted about two years ago with help from officials at OPS and the ASUO.

According to Cassandra Lautenschleger, safety advocate for the ASUO, funding for the \$30,000

project was discontinued following the first stage.

Lautenschleger then talked to Dan Williams, vice president of the University's administration, and others involved in the decision to cut the program. During several discussions with Williams, Lautenschleger persuaded him into reinstating funding.

"I was really proud of the University in working with us to get the funding back," Lautenschleger said.

She said another project in the second phase includes repainting the Duck feet seen on sidewalks and other walkways around campus. The Duck feet show students the safest routes to travel on campus.
