Golf pro says cart changes game

*Former PGA player says
walking is an integral
part of golf competition*

A former PGA Tour player famous for winning the 1964 U.S. Open after playing a 36-hole final round in heat exhaustion testified Thursday that allowing Casey Martin to ride in a motorized cart would "change the level of the game."

"You're talking about hitting the highest level of competition," said Ken Venturi, who said a doctor told him playing the final 18 holes of the 1964 U.S. Open could be fatal.

Venturi was the PGA Tour's first witness in the fourth day of Martin's trial in U.S. Magistrate Thomas Coffin's courtroom for the right to ride in a motorized cart on

the Nike Tour.

Martin suffers from a potentially disabling condition in his right leg that makes walking painful and causes him to limp noticeably.

Venturi stated exactly what the PGA Tour has argued this week, that walking is an integral part of the game, and went further by saying "fatigue is a big factor," another argument of the PGA Tour.



"That is what really alters your game," he said. "If you can't take fatigue and save one stroke, that's the difference between winning and being runner-up."

Venturi was outspoken and continued with the PGA Tour's claim that the case isn't about Martin; rather it is about the issue of allow-

ing a player to ride in a cart.

"I want this understood: I'm not here to go against Casey Martin," Venturi said. "But the idea is changing the rules where you must walk."

"I'm not dealing with personalities. I'm dealing in carts."

Venturi also debunked one of the arguments William Wiswall, one Martin's attorneys, used in the first three days of the trial.

Wiswall has argued that because members of the Senior PGA Tour, which falls under many of the same rules as the PGA Tour and Nike Tour, are allowed to use a cart, then Martin should too.

"It's a bunch of guys playing a round for a \$1 million," Venturi said of the Senior PGA Tour. "You're not dealing with the top draw. It's a round at the golf club."

Women look for revenge against UCLA

pressure off Oregon to beat Stanford
and Arizona later in the season*

It's nine down and nine to go for the Oregon women.

If the second round of Pacific-10 Conference games goes anything like the first for Oregon (11-6 overall, 7-2 Pac-10), the Ducks can go ahead and book their tickets to the NCAA Tournament for a fifth straight season.

There's still a long way to go, though, as the second half of the Pac-10 season gets underway for the Ducks tonight against UCLA (12-6, 7-2) in Los Angeles.

Oregon will be seeking a split in the season series after the Bruins beat the Ducks 80-75 in Eugene on Jan. 10.

"It's really important because they already have the split, and we're even with them in the conference standings," Oregon head coach Jody Runge said.



Heading into this week's games, the Ducks were in a three-way tie for second place with UCLA and Arizona, all one game behind Stanford (12-5, 8-1).

"We're in similar positions where we should be able to handle the teams below us in the standings right now, so it's going to be a big basketball game," Runge added. "I think we definitely need to get two wins against four teams, which are Stan-

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
