topics that will bring in a diverse group of people."

One of this year's new workshops, titled "White Privilege," will examine the foundation of institutionalized discrimination.

"There are three presumptions you get as a white person — that of innocence, worthiness and competence — that aren't afforded to people of color," said Cris Cullinan, a University training administrator who will lead the discussion. She said

she will look at ways to build a respectful and inclusive environment.

McNeal will give her keynote address, titled "Breathing Her-story," tonight at 7:30 in the EMU Ballroom. McNeal, winner of the 1997 Woman of Achievement Award, has overcome a past of abuse and struggle to become a renowned cultural activist and playwright. She will perform a one-woman play at 4 p.m. Saturday in 177 Lawrence in which she will portray eight roles in addressing rape and race.

"The performance is an incredible, emotional play. It makes you laugh and cry, and so we're hoping to have counselors available after the show," Afzali said.

Nakamura said she's looking forward to participating in the workshops.

"These issues are under-represented in our classrooms, and they need to be brought up in an open manner," she said.

Kitzhaber: Plans to limit campaign dollars

reduce the number of Oregonians on welfare, create a new approach to recovering endangered fish species and make significant investments in schools and universities.

In Kitzhaber's introduction, his mother said that from what she knew of him, he was the right man for the job. "He is a fixer and always has been," she said.

Kitzhaber said the decision to run for re-election was a hard one

to make because of his family and the demands of campaigning. He said he felt he was approaching "a very negative campaign." However, he never "felt unfulfilled" as governor, so he decided to run.

Republican candidate Bill Sizemore was originally scheduled to make his decision on Thursday in Portland, Eugene, Medford and Redmond as well, but he canceled after Kitzhaber announced identical plans. Sizemore changed his announcement

to Tuesday.

As long as his opponent complies, Kitzhaber said he is willing to adhere to the voluntary spending limit of \$1.5 million on his campaign. "Oregon voters think way too much money is spent on political campaigns," he said.

He also believes the upcoming election represents an important decision for Oregon voters.

"This election will determine how Oregon will enter the 21st century," he said.
