Elmer: Firing unlikely

have been contentious issues between advocates of development and conservationists.

In addition to Duemler's criticism of the council, former Councilman Paul Nicholson said Elmer may not be receiving a "fair process" of evaluation from the council.

"[Elmer] has been on the council one year, and she deserves a fair chance," Nicholson said. "She deserves to have the council's objections to her performance clearly communicated, and I feel she has been subject to the council's inability to articulate its own policies clearly. I think we should place the blame where it belongs."

Duemler echoed Nicholson's statements.

"We are not here to support one person," she said.

But Councilwoman Betty Taylor said she did not know if any such discussion to fire the city manager was planned for Wednesday's meeting.

"Personally, I think it is ludicrous," she said. "We need to talk

things over. I am alarmed and really upset."

Taylor said, however, that discussion of Elmer could not touch upon the manager's personnel decisions such as those surrounding Cooke's resignation. That would violate the city charter because it would influence the city manager regarding such decisions.

"That's trying to influence personnel decisions — and that's illegal," she said.

But Taylor added that the council had the right to fire the city manager at any meeting and that the former city manager had been in office for around 15 years.

According to Phil Weiler, a spokesman for the city, the council is still scheduled on Wednesday to choose a facilitator for Elmer's one-year evaluation in early March.

After Monday's press conference, Nicholson said the council's firing of Elmer on Wednesday would be less likely.

"If there was a Wednesday event, I'm sure it would be given second thoughts," he said.

rie Moses said the outreach program is helpful in building the connection between the University and public schools. The program also helps kids get a better view of science overall, she said.

"[The kids] benefit to see that science goes beyond their little school," she said. "It allows children to get a wider view of careers

Upcoming program events at Coburg Elementary will include in-class discussions about plant growth and ecosystems in third and fifth-grade classes and about butterflies and moths in first-grade classes.

Wells Fargo Bank robbed at gunpoint

Another one in a string of bank robberies hit Eugene again, this time at the Wells Fargo Bank, located at 2909 Portland St.

On Monday at about 3:25 p.m., an unknown male subject entered the bank, displayed a weapon and demanded money. After receiving an undetermined amount of money, the suspect

exited the bank and was last seen running south on Portland Street.

The suspect is described as a white male, 5 feet 7 inches, weighing 140 pounds, with short brown hair, clean-shaven, and wearing sunglasses, a light-colored baseball cap, tan jacket, greenish-plaid shirt and stone-washed jeans, and armed with a handgun.

The investigation is still underway.

to justify the estimated costs.

According to the EMU board, the city of Eugene has halted renovations in the EMU basement until fire sprinklers are installed. The EMU is required to install an elevator in the International Students Lounge to meet Americans with Disabilities Act mandates. Additional funding for the \$550,000 elevator will come from the University Foundation and the EMU Building Reserve Fund.

The heating and cooling system for the computing center is needed to handle the amount of computer equipment and users. According to the board, last spring during Dead Week temperatures in the computing center exceeded 102

degrees Fahrenheit.

"It's easy for people in the Senate to demonize the EMU," Wasson said. "None of these people are willing to look closely."

Wasson emphasized that time was of the essence for approving funding for these projects. But others expressed the need for correct estimates of the board's requests and more information on the projects.

"All they [students] know is that every year their incidental fee goes up a little bit," Bostic said. It is the EMU board's obligation to make students aware, she said.

Another meeting will be held today for the Senate to discuss how they will deal with the EMU board proposal.
