The three-day tournament is the No. 10 Ducks' first of the spring season and includes defending national champion Arizona State and No. 5 Tulsa in the 18-field team.

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Captain and all-time leading scorer Ezra Louthis and defensemen Jordan Weiner, Jason Khan and Chris Eberle are among the eight seniors who finished their Oregon careers Sunday.

The No. 3 Bruins lost to No. 2 Stanford 3-2 in the first game of the tournament Saturday evening. UCLA had a 2-1 lead entering the third period against the Cardinal, but it was unable to protect its lead and earn a spot in the championship game.

Sunday's game marked the fourth meeting between the Ducks and Bruins this season with the result being three UCLA victories in the four contests. The Bruins' first scoring line of center Eric Eisner, wing Ben Theule and wing Dumas Maugile tormented the Ducks by combining for six goals and nine

assists.

"It was a back-and-forth game, the momentum switched back and forth," Norman said. "But definitely one of the keys was staying out of the [penalty] box, and we unfortunately didn't do

The Bruins scored two goals in nine power-play chances and another one a second after a power play ended. The Ducks cashed in twice on five power-play opportunities.

UCLA dominated the early stages of the game. They claimed a 3-0 lead with 14:51 remaining in the second period when Eisner scored unassisted on a breakaway.

Oregon ended its scoring futility when Louthis, who plays right wing, found center Erik Williams just to the left of the Bruins' net for a power-play goal.

The Bruins and Ducks then traded goals to finish the second period with UCLA leading 4-2. Oregon freshman wing Peter Harris' scored the first of his three consecutive goals with 44 seconds remaining to gain some momentum heading into the locker room.

However, UCLA quickly resurrected its three-goal lead again 1:16 into the third period when Eisner scored his third goal.

Harris responded by scoring two goals within 12 seconds to narrow UCLA's lead to one and put the Ducks in a position to pull-off a comeback.

But the Bruins finished Oregon off with two more goals from their productive first line. Theule scored UCLA's sixth goal with eight minutes remaining, and Maugile closed the scoring with 1:04 left to play.
