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Crime: Westmoreland residents also fear prowlers

Yuki chased the burglar out the door and around the complex, screaming for help for five minutes. "I knew it was a dangerous thing to do, but it was instinct," she said.

The burglar, Joseph Lonergan, was finally subdued by a neighbor and arrested by Eugene police.

"I was so disappointed that only one person helped me," Yuki said. "Afterwards, everyone was standing on their balconies just watching."

Lonergan admitted to the break-in, as well as a burglary of another Spencer View unit earlier that day. He led police to a third apartment, rented by a student, where they found the stolen goods. The student was cited for receiving stolen property but not arrested, said Rob Olson of the Eugene Police Department.

Yuki said the experience topped months of losing bikes, shoes, porch chairs and a tricycle to thefts. "If that man would have had a gun, my daughter and I could be dead right now."

"I thought, 'What kind of place is this?' This isn't a safe community at all."

Imrie said attempts to get University Housing to increase security or evict the student cited for receiving stolen property have been fruitless.

"It's like the University is more worried about the reputation of the school than about the students," he said.

Frank Gaddini, director of Spencer View Family Housing, refused to comment, saying only that crime is a campus-wide problem not specific to family housing. He stressed that residents need to lock their doors and bikes more securely.

"We haven't received any requests [from University Housing] to increase staffing [at Spencer View]," said Lt. Joan Saylor, public safety director.

Michael Eyster, director of University Housing, said family housing units are designed for safety. Windows are placed so families can see children at play, emergency managers are on duty around the clock on weekends and security newsletters are distributed to residents.

Eyster would not comment on the burglary, but said hypothetically, "If we had reason to believe one student was involved in the breaking-in, in any way, of the residence of another, we would want that person evicted." He added that the University has the right to evict tenants without cause with a 30-day notice.

Still, crime around University Housing areas is a continuing

problem, Eyster said.

In the Westmoreland complex, another family housing unit, resident Shelly Richardson helped form a neighborhood watch when crime and theft escalated in the area.

"Crime in our family units is terrible," she said. "People are prowling around here every night, and the OPS patrol leaves at 1 a.m."

Richardson said the group formed a phone tree so residents can confront strangers together. She said the University has refused to put up "No Trespassing" signs.

"I don't feel like the University has any interest in helping people," she said, "and I don't think the OPS is doing enough."

"The issue is the kids — there are so many kids and so much crime that it's just a matter of time until something happens to a child."

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Programs Financing

The Programs Finance Committee allocated \$108,327 to 11 organizations since last Wednesday. That puts the total amount allocated above \$1 million. The PFC is slightly above the 2 percent benchmark it set for itself.
