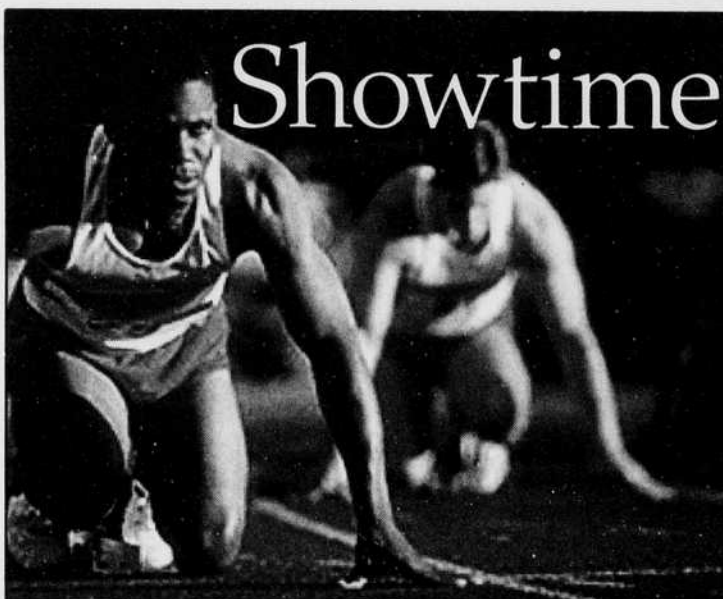

Programs Financing

The Programs Finance Committee allocated more than \$680,000 in meetings on Feb. 26, Feb. 28 and March 2. It also committed \$32,500 to a salary for a Women's Center director. That line item had been tabled at an earlier meeting so the Women's Center could better define the position. The PFC has planned two more regular meetings and an appeals meeting before it takes the complete program budget to the Senate early next term.

some classes," DeBuse said. "They close doors for themselves."

Some fields have traditionally been dominated by a particular sex, making students of the other sex more uncomfortable in them.

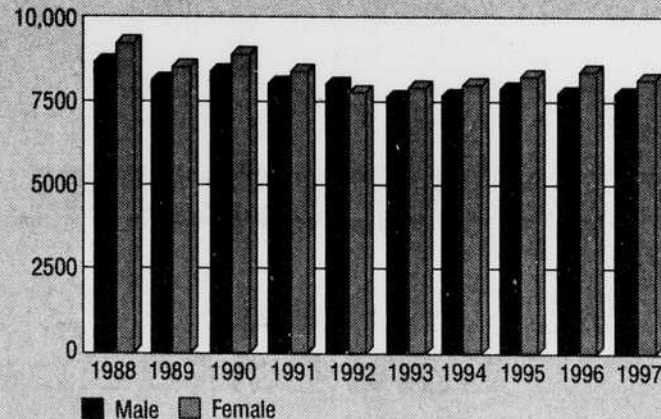
Other fields attract one gender because of basic differences between the genders, DeBuse said. Women tend to be more nurturing and caring; men more competitive.

Because of that, men tend to dominate the high-profile positions, DeBuse said. That same pattern affects the University.

"There are more women involved, but something like 80 percent of the CEOs are men," Peatow said. "I think that's true at the University. When you walk into Johnson Hall, who do you see?"

Women have represented a slight majority of University students for more than a decade. 1992 was the only year that broke the pattern; administrators don't know why.

Senators confirm Con Court justices

Student senators overwhelmingly confirmed two new ASUO

constitutional court appointees Wednesday. The vote fills court positions that have been vacant since October 1997.

Jeremy Gibbons, an undergraduate, and Anna Spickerman, a first year law student, will serve as justices for the remainder of their time at the University.

"I'm profoundly impressed by the candidates. I'm glad the ASUO did the required search in a fair and impartial manner," senator Jenna Wasson said.

The ASUO's previous appointee, Jenny Jaeger, was withdrawn last month when questions were raised over unfair ASUO hiring practices.

"We had a lot of excellent candidates, and these are simply the best ones for the job," ASUO President Bill Miner said.

The Senate also approved part of a special request from Model United Nations. The group was seeking over \$5,000 for speakers and a group trip to a conference in San Francisco. Senators voted to grant \$2,094 for the May first symposium, which will bring U.N. officials to campus.

But they severely limited money for the conference, granting only \$663 out of a requested \$2440.60. Senators also refused to forgive a \$600 Model U.N. debt.

In other Senate business, money was given to the ASUO executive to sign the Cherry Poppin' Daddies, Marigold, and the American Girls for the EMU Courtyard's grand opening event. The free concert is planned for May 1.
