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Men's golfers advance to 2nd place

Ducks have home course advantage in today's final round

After the first day of competition at the Oregon Duck Classic, the Oregon men's golf team sits just five shots behind first-place Oregon State and three shots ahead of pre-tournament favorite Brigham Young.

Oregon was one of only two teams which recorded combined scores of par or better after Monday's opening round. The No. 48 Ducks finished second among 17 teams at the Emerald Valley Golf Course in Creswell. The final 18 holes will be played today.

Andrew Tredway fired a three-under-par 69 in morning compe-

tion, then shot a three-over-par 75 in the afternoon to finish the 36-hole day at even par. The sophomore's ninth-place finish led the Ducks and was one shot ahead of Ryan Lavoie and Adrian Burtner who both finished tied for 12th.



Ben Crane, the Ducks' most consistent top finisher this season, finished in a tie for 27th after firing a three-over-par 75 in the morning and even par in the afternoon. Ben Crane was Oregon's fifth scorer after a two-under-par 70 and an eight-over-par 80 landed him tied for 44th.

With rain likely to fall throughout the final round, Oregon head coach Steve Nosler said the Ducks

could have an advantage on the soft Emerald Valley course. And with four top 10 finishes in its first six tournaments this season, Oregon should enter today's final round with confidence.

The Ducks tied for sixth place at the Taylor Made Intercollegiate tournament on Feb. 13 at the Waialoa Golf Course in Kona, Hawaii. Ben Crane, who ranks No. 43 in the nation by the Mastercard Collegiate Golf Rankings, led Oregon with a tie for sixth after firing an eight-over-par 216.

Oregon's best result was a fourth-place finish in its season opener at the Pacific Invitational on Sept. 22. Crane again led all Duck scorers with a 10-under-par 206 that gave him a share of first place. The junior fired rounds of 67, 69 and 70 en route to the first tournament title of his career.

Men's lacrosse evens record with win

The women's lacrosse team started league play with losses to UW, Whitman and Linfield

Thanks to a blowout victory and a forfeit last weekend, the Oregon Club Sports men's lacrosse team evened its league record.

The Ducks (3-3) crushed Pacific Lutheran 19-4 at Southbank Field on Saturday behind a balanced scoring attack. Midfielder Schuyler Harrison scored three goals and added two assists, while attackman John Lauerman also scored three goals to lead Oregon. Overall, 10 different players tallied goals for the Ducks.

Puget Sound forfeited its Sunday match with Oregon because it was unable to gather enough players to make the trip to Eugene.

"It was a nice weekend to get a little redemption for the last weekend," said head coach Peter Hoffman, alluding to two Oregon losses Feb. 28 and March 1.

A chance to get above .500 will be on the line for the Ducks when they travel to Washington State for their next game on March 28.

"We're at the point right now where we have to win all the rest of our games," Hoffman said, "if we want to control our own destiny."

Women's lacrosse

In its first league competition of the season, the Oregon Club Sports women's lacrosse team lost all three of its games last Saturday in Walla Walla, Wash.

"We did pretty well considering we had no substitutes, and we were down a lot of crucial players," Meehan said.

The Ducks lost to league rivals Linfield, Whitman and Washington. However, all three games were close and could have had a different outcome had Oregon been at full strength, Meehan said.

"I think the most important thing was that a lot of our new players who had never played lacrosse before got a three-game crash course about what the game is all about," Meehan said.

The Western States Tournament in Palo Alto, Calif., on April 4 and 5 is Oregon's next competition.

Equestrian

Although it had just 10 riders at the event, the Oregon Club Sports equestrian team won 12 ribbons at an intercollegiate horse show at Cal Poly SLO on Sunday.

"It was a wonderful show again," student coordinator Megan Robinson said. "We have a few new members who all did really well."

Included in the 12-ribbon total were three first-place finishes for the Ducks.

Robinson won the novice flat class and three ribbons overall, Kimberly Franklin was victorious in novice fences, and Christina Gomez-Novy topped the rest of the field in advanced walk, trot canter.

The tournament had been postponed from an earlier date because of flooding in California.
