10 — the same league record of last season's senior-dominated team. Five of the Ducks' losses came by a combined 13 points, including last Saturday's 75-71 loss to the Golden Bears that knocked the Ducks out of NIT contention.

"This basketball team just did an outstanding job adjusting to a new staff and a new system and a new philosophy," said first-year head coach Ernie Kent. "Individually, there was just an enormous amount of improvement that allowed us to really come together."

The fact that no one player really stood out for Oregon — hence

the entire team being named the most improved at its annual banquet Monday night — was marked as a strength of the team by Kent.

Despite being labeled as over-achievers, a losing record still doesn't sit well with Kent, who last season at this time was preparing Saint Mary's for its first-round game against Wake Forest in the NCAA Tournament.

That is the goal Kent has set for Oregon and one he believes this season's squad has set a solid foundation for.

With all players but guard Jamar Curry and forward Henry Madden returning next year, including a solid recruiting class that is expected to make an immediate impact,

Oregon should be contenders for an NIT or NCAA berth.

"Every player, at one point or another, helped this basketball team this year," Kent said. "So now, our expectations are that they should be able to play at that level all the time. I'm expecting good things out of all of them because they all showed good things this year."

They certainly did. But how was I to know?

Tournament appearance, the Oregon women are the only team in the conference, other than Stanford, to have made the past five tournaments.

Awards

In the season-ending Pacific-10 Conference award selections, three Oregon Ducks received conference honors.

Natalie Hughes took first-team all-conference honors by leading the team with an average of 15.5 points. Her selection keeps alive Oregon's streak of five straight seasons with a player on the first team.

Also receiving honors were freshmen Brianne Meharry and Angelina Wolvert. The two became the second and third Oregon players to be named to the Pac-10's all-freshman team in the past two seasons. Sophomore Jen-

ny Mowe, who sat out this season with a knee injury, was an all-freshman team selection last year.

Meharry was leading the team in scoring and rebounding when she tore her ACL on Jan. 23 against Arizona State and missed the remainder of the season. Wolvert had season highs of 26 points and 12 rebounds against the Sun Devils and averaged 8.7 points and 4.7 rebounds per game.

For her play against Stanford and California last week, Oregon's Natasha O'Brien was named Pac-10 player of the week. O'Brien averaged 19 points and 3.5 rebounds and shot 60.9 percent from the field in an average of 25 minutes a game last week.
