

ASUO: E-mail voting a possibility

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ASUO elections coordinator Christy Lorenzini. "We want people to get involved."

The primaries will be April 15 and 16, and the general election will be April 22 and 23.

The ASUO will offer organizations \$50 a day to work the 9 a.m.-to-5 p.m. shift at one of the five or six poll booths during the elections. It also is soliciting help to design flyers that raise elections awareness, Lorenzini said.

The ASUO will publicize the elections more this year than in the past in hope of increasing voter turnout, Lorenzini said. Candidates will visit greek houses and the residence halls. The presidential and vice presidential candidates will also have a debate on April 14 in 100 Willamette from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

There is a "50-50 chance" students may have the ability to vote by e-mail this year, Lorenzini said, but that possibility depends

on University administration helping the process.

This year's elections will have several uncontested candidates and some open positions. Nobody is running for two Building Fee Committee positions and two Student Senate positions.

Uncontested candidates include: Asha Mary John for the EMU board, Helen Stocklin-Enright for the Programs Finance Committee, Teresa Tobin for PFC and Jesse Gordon Long for Student Senate.

The ASUO Student Senate met for the last time this term on March 4. University President Dave Frohnmayer had not agreed to an official definition of the Overrealized Fund, an account of surplus student fees, before the final meeting. This means the EMU board's special request, which it wants from the Overrealized Fund, will not be heard until spring term. The final request on the table was \$250,000 when the Senate postponed it.

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The Oregon Daily Emerald, the independent student newspaper at the University of Oregon, is accepting applications for the position of Editor for the 1998-99 academic year.

To be eligible, a candidate must be:

- ▶ An undergraduate student at the University enrolled for a minimum of six credit hours per term in three of the four academic quarters of his or her term as Editor, or
- ▶ A graduate student at the University enrolled for a minimum of three credit hours per term in three of the four academic quarters of his or her term as Editor.

Applicants must be in good academic standing.

The Oregon Daily Emerald is published by a nonprofit corporation that operates independently of the University. The primary purpose of the ODE is to provide education and training for students in all aspects of newspaper operation by serving a campus audience with news, editorial and advertising content.

The Editor of the ODE, who reports to a 10-person volunteer Board of Directors, has responsibility for all editorial operations and all editorial content of the newspaper. Term of office is June 9, 1998, through the last issue of Spring term 1999 and is preceded by an orientation period that begins no later than May 1 and extends through June 8. This is a paid position.

Completed applications must be returned to the ODE Board of Directors in the ODE office by 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, March 31, 1998. An individual will be selected by the Board on April 14.

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
