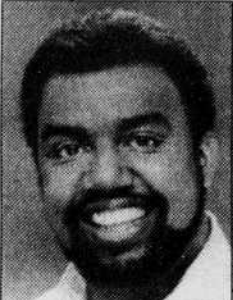

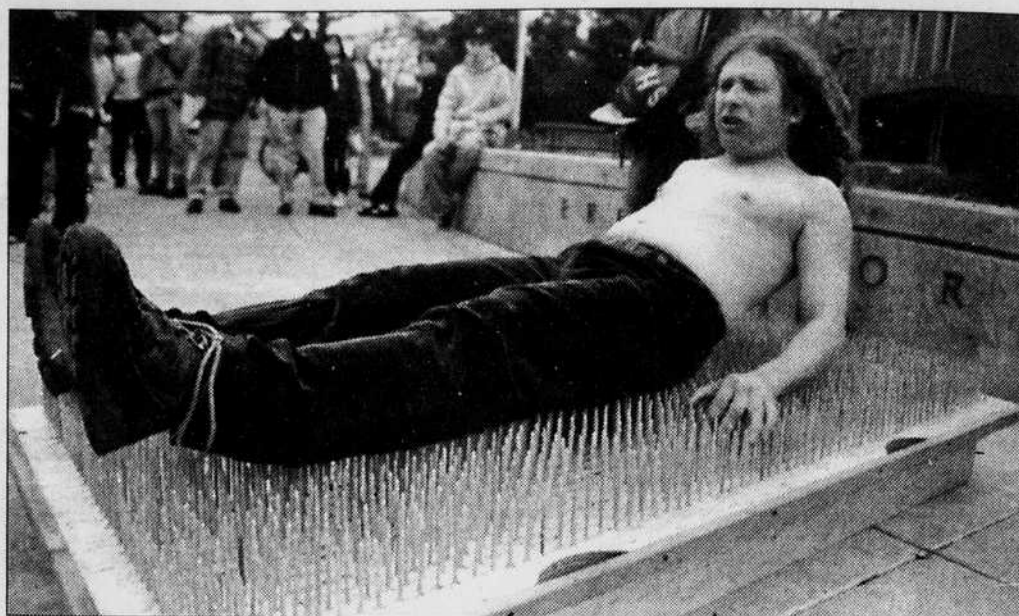

Labor activist to visit middle school

Students in Ganas, a Latino and Chicano group, invited 'dream speaker' Dolores Huerta

As a longstanding symbol of dedication in the struggle for farm workers' rights, Dolores Huerta has spent more than 35 years in strikes, boycotts and campaigns across North America. She has gone through fractured ribs and numerous arrests in fighting for labor unions.

At 67 years of age, Huerta continues to influence the next generation.

In conjunction with the University's Race, Work and Economic Justice Conference this weekend, Huerta, the co-founder of the United Farm Workers Union, will speak with Ganas, a Chicano/Latino middle school group, at a 2 p.m. assembly in the Churchill High School auditorium.

Now in its second year, Ganas brings members of MEChA, the University's Latino student union, in contact with Kennedy Middle School students several times a

week, mentoring and tutoring the younger students as well as educating them about their cultural heritage. Part of their interaction involves an annual Ganas assembly.

At the beginning of the year, Roscoe Caron, an eighth-grade teacher at Kennedy Middle School and the liaison for the Ganas program at Kennedy, said the students had planned on honoring Latina women in their second annual assembly.

Their dream speaker was Dolores Huerta, Caron said, and it just happened that she would be in Eugene for the University's conference in April. The group scheduled their assembly around Huerta's Eugene appearance and were able to get her to attend.

"The kids were pumped," Caron said. "She and Linda Chavez-Thompson are the most important Latinas involved in the labor union movement in America."

Chavez-Thompson was voted the first-ever Latina executive vice president of the AFL-CIO in 1995.

Amy Casso, the external director of MEChA, said University students had been preparing the mid-

dle school students for the annual assembly through informational sessions on farm worker issues and Huerta's activities.

But Casso stressed that the students had prepared the assembly themselves. "This is their assembly," she said. "It's the Ganas students who are planning it."

Casso said that while many students are well informed about the struggles of Martin Luther King Jr. and Cesar Chavez, co-founder of the National Farm Workers Association, they had less knowledge about women involved in the very same labor causes. She said she believes it is important to demonstrate to students that women are just as influential as men.

Casso said she wants Huerta's dedication to reflect most heavily on the students. "She's never given up," she said. "You still see her. This is what is really important." She said that people who gain popularity sometimes lose sight of their communities but that Huerta has never done that.

Huerta, who is currently the secretary-treasurer of the UFW, began her career fighting for civil rights in 1955, according to the UFW Web page.

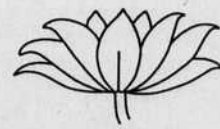
