Skaters: 'Stunting' is not allowed

for skateboarding violations, which carry about a \$50 fine. But skateboarders can be cited for trespassing if they skateboard on private property or criminal mischief if they do "tricks" that may damage property, he explained.

The same rules apply for bicyclists, in-line skaters and skateboarders regarding reckless behavior, Saxon said.

Skateboarder Matt Bergevin thinks there is definitely tension between skateboarders and police. He said he has been stopped for skateboarding coming back from Boardsports, a popular supply store.

"I think it is unfair that Rollerbladers don't get busted, too," he said. "Now that they want to do sliding and rails, they'll be wrecking property, too."

Cole Miller skateboards primarily for transportation on campus and has gotten a ticket for skateboarding in Eugene. He sometimes drives to the University and skates to class.

"Bikes can be a hassle," he said, "and skateboarding shouldn't be nailed when it's being used as a mode of transportation."

Alise Lamoreaux, one of the owners of the Campus Skate Company, located on East 13th Avenue near Patterson Street, said the no-skateboarding signs are in hard-to-see places.

"The sign is as high as the roof across the street," she said. The one on 13th Avenue faces the second floor of Sacred Heart Medical Center, she added.

Lamoreaux said she believes the ordinance unfairly targets skateboarders.

"There isn't an ordinance about bikes going down the street," she said. "This is specific to skateboarders."

Luna said pedestrians have the

right of way on campus. The only official places skateboarders and bicyclists must use are the bike paths along Agate Street. The bike path along 13th Avenue that originates at Kincaid Street is intended for bicyclists, but the city ordinance prohibits skateboarding on it.

The large strip of paved road closed to automobiles along 13th Avenue is intended to be used for walking bikes and skateboards.

Non-students can also be given tickets. Criminal trespass can be used to bar individuals from campus who repeatedly are warned by OPS, Luna explained.

"All of it could be avoided by the attitude of the person," Luna

said. "Confrontational attitudes may lead the officer to believe a warning will not be sufficient."

OPS and the University's planning commission will post signs in the courtyard to warn students of the regulations.

Skateboarders like Bergevin and Miller can use the Crazy 8 Skate Park at the Lane County Fairgrounds. For \$6, skaters can use the various half-pipes and rail slides set up in an indoor warehouse. Helmets are required and can be rented at the park.

But for many skateboarders, street skating is their love.

"Skateboarding wasn't meant for indoor use only," Bergevin said. "People are going to want to skate in the streets."
