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ences in causes and symptoms of the disorder that would distinguish between types of depression.

Markley's study uses a more experimental research technique, asking participants to view videotaped depictions of social interactions and fill in questionnaires about their responses, he said.

Markley will examine the

cognitive factors that prevent women from recovering from depression. Depressed women's perceptions and interpretive styles cause them to respond to certain situations in ways that perpetuate the disorder, he said.

"If you are not depressed and someone insults you, you can blow it off," Harkness said.

"If you are depressed, you would take that as a personal attack and get even more de-

pressed."

Women who think they are experiencing depression are needed to take part in both studies.

Participants will be paid \$10 to take part in each study and will also be given the opportunity to attend a treatment workshop that will provide them with skills to better cope with their depression. Call 346-4896 for more information.

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
