Men: Father-son issues are focus

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As the lover archetype evolved during the 1960s and 1970s, some men began to question the warrior archetype, Evans said. Men began to recognize issues resulting from relationships, or a lack thereof, with their fathers.

Consequently, there is a societal movement toward fatherhood, according to Evans.

"Men are becoming more interested in being fathers," he said.

The New Male will address father-son issues. The focus will be on creating an internal father and son and playing out father-son battles.

Other archetypes that will be

explored include the magician, the fool and the king, Evans said.

The king archetype is the "embodiment of the mature male," Evans said. "If you have a good king, your whole kingdom will flourish."

The goals of the New Male are to achieve more intimate and emotionally satisfying communication with other males, he said.

"We may be midwifing a different culture — a culture not dominated by the warrior archetype," Evans said.

Evans earned his doctorate in clinical psychology from the University of North Carolina in 1986.

He has been involved in Eugene men's groups and the men's movement since the 1980s.

Evans has led similar groups in years past. Attendance has averaged five to eight men with ages ranging from 19 to 40.

"Those who attended have had great experiences," Evans said.

Pete Harris, a pre-doctoral intern at the counseling center, will help Evans lead the group.

The group will meet for 90 minutes once a week, starting Monday. It is open to undergraduate and graduate students. For more information, call 346-3227.

McRee. It could work with the chapter and local alumni advisors; extreme cases could involve the national chapter organization.

"This isn't just an answering machine," he said. "We like to think we're very aggressive."

But the greek system still needs people to come forward with hazing complaints before it can really act, said Dominic Greene, Interfraternity Council vice president of new member education.

The University's greek system has tried to educate new members about hazing in programs such as Greek 101. It has also publicized the hotline along with other crisis lines.

But the system can only let members know what they should do if they get hazed. It cannot regulate initiations or activities and must wait for someone to file a report.

"If someone says something anonymously, it's really tough," Greene said. "It's all hearsay. It's frustrating."
