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Election: Injunction dismissed

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year's numbers.

Ten of the 13 candidates named in a grievance filed with the elections board made it to the final ballot.

Autumn De Poe said in that grievance that members of the Progressive Slate campaigned illegally by putting up a table in front of Columbia Hall without scheduling it with the University. She also claimed a banner hung near the tables violated elections rules.

The Constitution Court appointed three hearings officers to investigate De Poe's charges. It could decide the case next week, Chief Justice Joel Corcoran said.

Corcoran dismissed a request for an injunction against the elections Thursday. Ryan Ostitis had filed that request following De Poe's grievance, saying so many people were involved that the court should address it before the elections were continued.

Corcoran dismissed the case because Ostitis is not a student and therefore cannot bring complaints.

The candidates named in De Poe's grievance also asked the court to dismiss De Poe's case. They said they had not received notice that De Poe had filed a grievance with them.

Shoah: Candlelight vigil to end week

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"It's very appropriate for anyone who has no knowledge of the Holocaust," Favero said. "It's a creative expression. It's a great way to present very difficult material."

That difficult subject will be on display as a visual history in the EMU Fir Room from April 19 to April 21. The Jewish Student Union will display images from the Simon Wiesenthal Center. Wiesenthal was a Jewish man who participated in hunting Holocaust criminals of war.

Another Shoah program will take place at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the EMU Fir Room. "The Next Generation" is about one girl's understanding of her grandfather's experiences in Berlin. Harry Katz, 69, along with his 20-year-old daughter, who is a University student, and 12-year-old granddaughter, Linda, will participate in a panel discussion about the family's lessons from the Holocaust and the lessons passed on to younger generations.

preceding the program, the Jewish Student Union will show a short video of Linda interviewing her grandfather about his experiences during World War II.

"I really hope people take away a sense that even in such a horrible event in our history, over 50 years later we still remember and are in dialogue," Favero said. "Even in the horrible events, people still survive. Even

people who are not Jewish were involved."

The events during the week of Shoah are not just for the Jewish community, but are for everyone, Favero said, because the Holocaust involved the ancestors of so many.

The Jewish Student Union will finish the week with a 24-hour reading of the names of Jews who died in Nazi concentration camps. Opening ceremonies begin at 6:45 p.m. in the EMU Amphitheater on April 22, and the reading will end with a candlelight vigil at sundown on April 23, when people will be able to discuss the week of remembrance. Volunteers are welcome to participate in the name reading.
