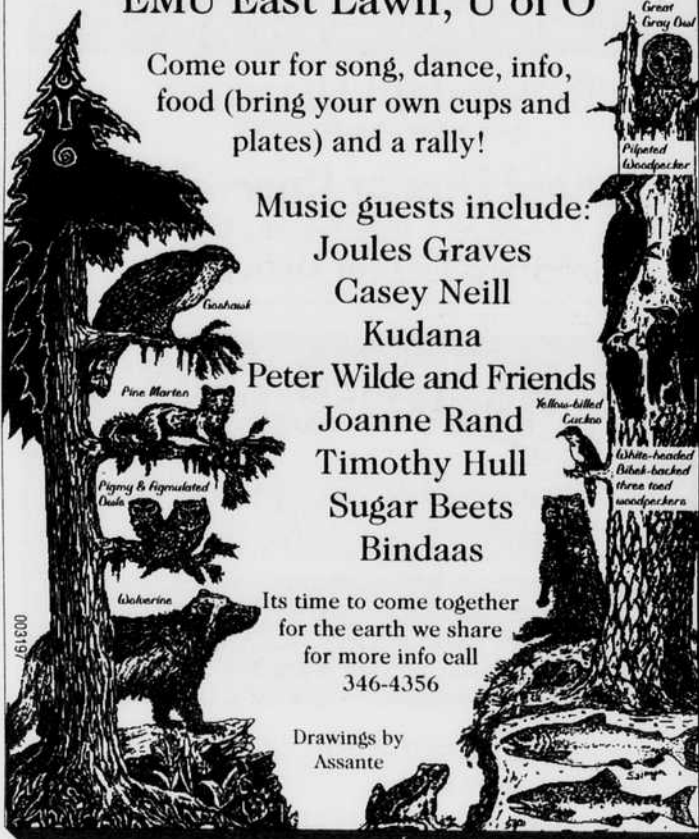

ASUO BALLOT MEASURES

Measure would end students' LTD refund

Ballot Measure 4 will request funding for unlimited busing for students on Lane Transit District's service line during the school year and between terms.

The measure would allocate approximately \$354,000 in student fees at a cost of \$6.87 a student per term and \$10.31 per term for law students.

In previous years, students were able to request a refund if they decided not to use the service.

The measure doesn't allow the option this year for two reasons.

New student IDs no longer have stickers indicating current enrollment, and few students requested the refund, ASUO President Bill Miner said.

Measures would give more funding to DDS

Two measures on the elections ballot will help fund the Designated Driver Shuttle next year.

Ballot Measure 5 will increase student incidental fees by \$1.06 per term and generate \$50,000, which would allow DDS to run seven days a week.

DDS public relations director

Brandon Smith said local bars often have drink specials on nights DDS doesn't run. Currently, DDS runs Wednesday through Saturday.

"Just about every Sunday or Monday night you'd be amazed how many people call us for a ride," Smith said.

Ballot Measure 10 would increase student incidental fees by 47 cents per term to purchase a new 15-passenger van.

"Friday nights are our busiest night, and we still have waits of up to 45 minutes," Smith said.

"It really enhances our ability to turn over our apartments to new tenants," he said of the coming changes.

Gaddini estimated it can cost \$400 to \$600 more to clean a room that has been smoked in than one that has not. Rugs, blinds, doors and walls all need to be washed, scrubbed or repainted.

"We're talking about time when we could have people living in," he said. Spencer View usually has a list of people waiting to get in, Gaddini said.

"Our approach is just to say we don't want to make any comments about smoking, whether it's good or bad for your health," Gaddini said. In his research, Gaddini said he found some uni-

versities that banned smoking within 20 feet of the building and even charcoal, but that probably will not happen.

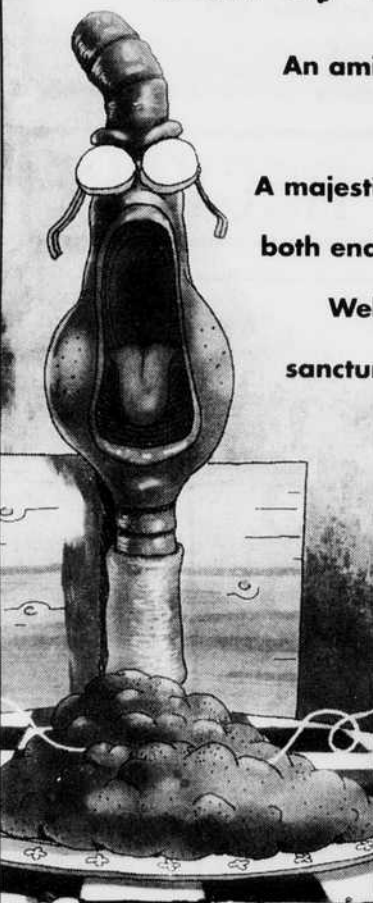
Donahoe and Gaddini have each received feedback from residents. Donahoe said she has received only support for the smoking ban, while Gaddini said two people told him they opposed the changes.

"Most people that live with us want to do the right thing," Gaddini said. "My gut feeling is most people will follow the rule."

Many residents already leave their apartments to smoke, Donahoe and Gaddini said.

"We want to make it where the residents win and we win," Donahoe said.

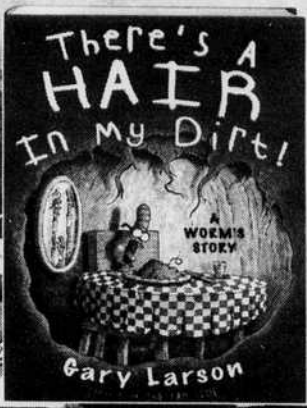
