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teams with no real reasoning behind the teams," Cowling explained. "We've put different teams together to create a strong support structure with connection and communication."

The University affairs coordinator, outreach director and programs administrator are together on an advocacy team, while the multicultural advocate, international students and non-traditional students advocates and the recruitment and retention coordinator are on a diversity team.

Wortman and Cowling will replace the ASUO administrative assistant with a campus organizer who will make student government more active through grassroots organization and training, Wortman said.

Next year's executive also plans to work together with other branches of the student government, such as the Student Senate, the Programs Finance Committee and the EMU board, to create a stronger working relationship, Wortman said.

"We want to accomplish bigger goals next year," she said. "There

is no way we can do this without using all the branches of the student government together."

Wortman and Cowling will take over the office on May 25, provided that the Constitution Court finalizes the elections results and resolves all the grievances.

Until then, Wortman and Cowling are looking for a few good students to help them run the ASUO.

"We are working to build bridges that were destroyed during the elections," Wortman said. "We want a cohesive whole where all students are working for the greater good."

Student health fee to increase next year

The University Health Center will raise its fee from \$71 to \$72. The increase will cover staff wages and salary increases slated for the 1998-99 school

year, said Bob Petit, a health center administrator.

This is the second year in a row that the health center increased the fee by \$1, Petit said.

The Counseling Center will maintain its \$9 fee from last year, said Gwen Tistadt, coun-

seling center office manager.

These numbers are only recommendations that still must be approved by the University budget office and the Oregon University System, Petit said.
