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Mariners pound Toronto pitcher

Roger Clemens allowed nine earned runs and 10 hits in five innings

TORONTO — Roger Clemens was already having a bad day and Ken Griffey Jr., made it worse.

Griffey hit his 16th home run to tie teammate Alex Rodriguez for the American League lead, and the Seattle Mariners scored the most earned runs off Roger Clemens in seven years, beating the Toronto Blue Jays 9-4 on Monday.

"My philosophy against Clemens is to just get in there and get out," Griffey said. "He's going to give you a pitch to hit."

Griffey's three-run homer in the fourth inning left him one behind Mark McGwire, the major league leader. It gave Seattle a 7-3 lead against Clemens, who rejoined the Blue Jays on Sunday after spending four days in Texas to be with his wife, Debbie, who had kidney

stones.

Clemens (4-5) allowed nine earned runs and 10 hits in five innings. It was only the third time in his career that the four-time Cy Young Award winner had given up nine earned runs in a game.

"The only mistake that I felt I made was I threw a forkball that tumbled out to [John] Marzano, and he ended up getting a triple," Clemens said.

Marzano had four RBIs for the Mariners. Clemens and Marzano were teammates in Boston from 1987-1992 and have remained good friends. Marzano thinks Clemens was doing him a favor with that forkball.

"I think he felt bad for me," Marzano said. "I think he wanted to keep me in the big leagues and give me a couple hits."

Paul Spoljaric (3-0) allowed one run and one hit in 3 1/3 innings af-

ter replacing starter Ken Cloude in the third inning.

Seattle scored four two-out runs off Clemens in the second. Edgar Martinez led off with an infield single and took second on third baseman Ed Sprague's throwing error. Two outs later, Rob Ducey reached on another infield hit, moving Martinez to third.

Marzano followed with a two-run triple. Joey Cora singled in Marzano and Rodriguez drove in Cora with an RBI double to make it 4-0.

Toronto got a run back in the second on Craig Grebeck's two-out RBI double and two more runs in the third when Mike Stanley and Ed Sprague hit RBI singles.

The Mariners took a 7-3 lead in the fourth when Griffey hit his sixth career home run off Clemens.

Toronto added a run in the fourth when Grebeck, making his first start of the season at short stop, homered to make it 7-4. Marzano increased the Mariners lead to 9-4 in the fifth with a two-run double.

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
