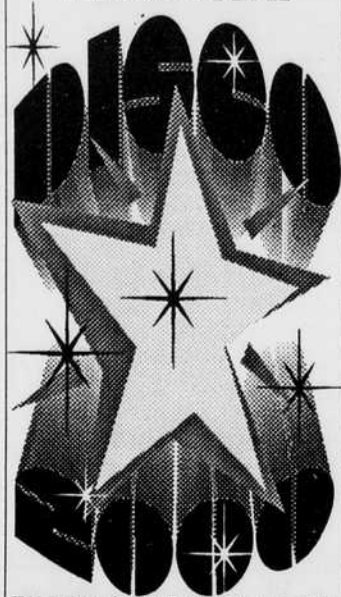


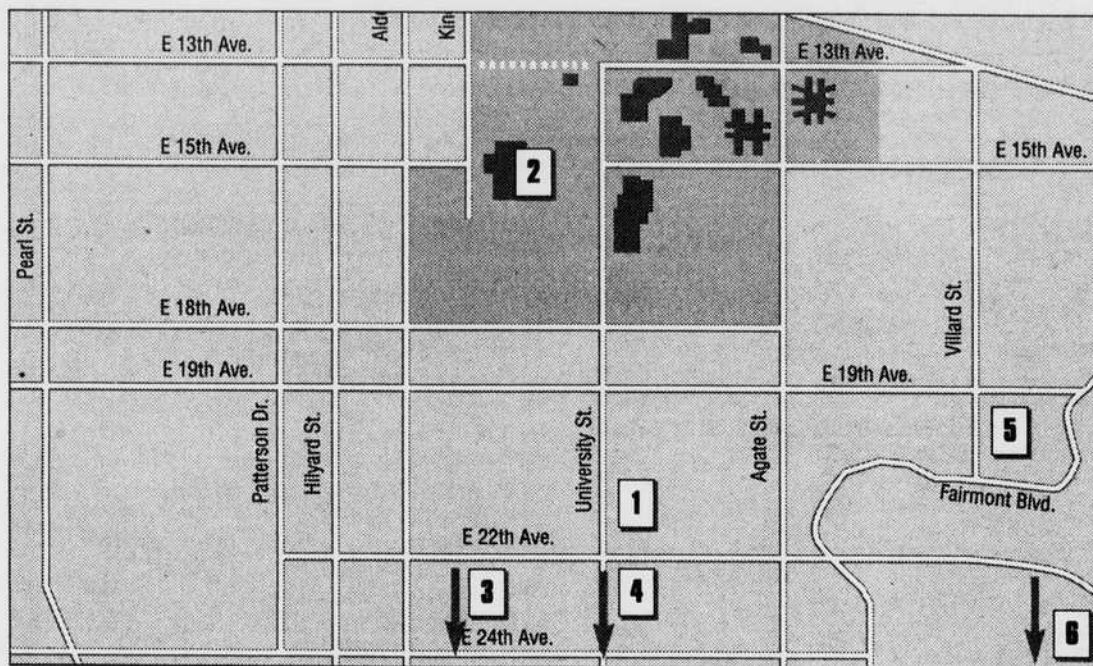

POLICE BEAT



Biker OK after hitting door of parked car

1 At about 5 p.m. on Monday, a biker traveling north on University Street struck an open car door of a parked Honda Civic, according to OPS Officer Gino Acuna. The driver of the car opened the door and the biker hit it. Acuna said the biker was taken home by her husband and both the biker and driver were OK.

Man exposes himself in Knight Library

2 A man was caught masturbating Monday on the third floor of Knight Library between shelves of books, police said.

Agent Rob Olson from the Eugene Police Department said the case of indecent exposure was reported by a library employee at about 4:20 p.m.

After being seen, the suspect ejaculated on the floor, grabbed his backpack and ran, Olson said. He said evidence would be collected and DNA tests could be run if necessary.

The suspect is described as a white male in his early 20s with black hair and a beard. He was wearing a white button-down shirt. He is also described as having a round face and a medium to heavy build.

Olson said he only knew of one other incident of indecent exposure related to masturbation during this school year. The other incident occurred in the Science Library.

Olson said all OPS officers were notified of the suspect.

Students issued noise-disturbance violation

3 Three University students were issued noise-disturbance citations after Eugene police officers were called to their residence by a neighbor two blocks away. The neighbor complained to the police about a loud stereo during the early morning on Sunday.

According to a police report, officers arrived at the residence, 2522 Kincaid St., and could hear music emanating from the back of the residence as they stood on a sidewalk in front of the house.

Officers could hear the sounds of approximately 50 people inside the house, the report said.

The three residents of the house told police they were all seniors and were having a graduation party. A citation was issued because the area was a residential neighborhood population of mostly homeowners and non-students. Citations were also issued because of the distance from which the music was audible and the city's noise ordinance.

Five students issued alcohol violations

4 Five University students were charged with possessing alcohol and making it available to minors. Police saw two underage girls run out of the front door of a house while holding bottles of wine Saturday.

Three other minor-in-possession citations were issued in relation to the party at the house, 2420 University St., a police report said.

After the two girls were seen

coming out of the house, officers approached and questioned them about the party. The girls said they had drunk beer and wine at the party.

Police observed 40 to 60 people outside the house, and the interior appeared full, the report said. Officers then talked to the five residents at the house, who were all under 21 years old. The residents gave police permission to search the house.

Once inside the house, officers discovered 70 to 120 opened beer cans and bottles, six empty gallons of juice, three empty half-gallons of vodka and 19 empty half-case boxes of beer, the report said.

Police watched as many people, some who appeared to be underage, left through the front door, the report said.

Officers noticed a ring in the carpet about 16 inches in diameter, which they recognized as the size of a garbage can usually used to put a keg and ice in. Police later found the garbage can and the keg in the basement of the house.

The residents told police an unknown person bought the cases of beer and the keg and took admission money at the door. The keg was seized because it had no identification and because underage people had been drinking at the party, the report said.

Five students charged with supplying alcohol

5 Five University students were charged with making alcohol available to minors after police were called to a party by local residents who complained about people parking automobiles in their driveways and urinating on their lawns, a police report said.

Officers arrived to find 40 to 50 people in the front yard and in an open garage at 1405 E. 20th Ave., some with open beer cans and bottles in their hands. Many of the party-goers left on foot after seeing police cars arrive on the scene.

While the officers were standing on the sidewalk in front of the house, an unknown person threw a beer bottle at them. The bottle hit the ground and shattered about 20 feet from the officers, the report

said.

Police contacted the residents of the house, who cooperated in terminating the party and clearing the house at the officers' request.

Officers also issued citations for minor in possession of alcohol and consumption on unlicensed premises.

Officials say ecstasy manufactured in lab

6 Members of the Lane Inter-Agency Narcotics Enforcement Team discovered a drug lab where they believe ecstasy was manufactured, according to an EPD press release.

The department's INET members, in conjunction with the Springfield Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Agency, discovered the lab while serving a search warrant at 307 E. 29th Place on Monday afternoon. Officers detected an odor and observed chemicals consistent with the manufacture of methamphetamines in the adjacent yard at 309 E. 39th Place. According to the press release, both residences are in a duplex.

A search warrant for 309 E. 39th Place was obtained late Monday afternoon and was served early Monday evening. Detectives observed a number of chemicals on the property, but not enough of any one product for residents to successfully manufacture methamphetamines. The press release also said that an Oregon State Police lab technician was called to the scene to assist in identifying the chemicals and any product derived from them. One sample tested contained components found in ecstasy.

INET Sgt. Pete Kerns said this is the first lab his team has seized that was involved in the manufacture of ecstasy. Police took chemical samples of the evidence and disposed of the rest. The residence at 309 E. 39th Place has been declared a "chemically hazardous" site by the state Department of Health, but Kerns noted in the report that the house posed no hazard to the neighborhood as of Tuesday afternoon.
