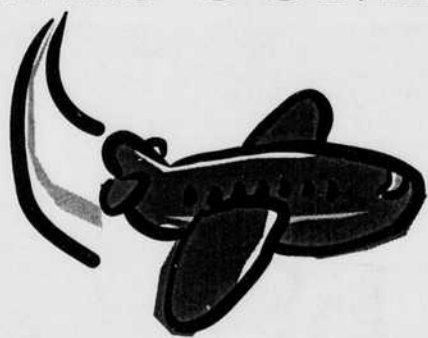

ing aggressive] a bit."

A victory for Kergroach would also tie him for second on the all-time Oregon list for singles wins in a season at 21 with John DeVorss. Dougal Williams holds first place on the list with 24 wins in 1995.

Kergroach also became the first-ever Duck to be nationally ranked in singles, ascending to as high as No. 42, and led the team from his No. 1 singles position to its first-ever NCAA Regional Championships appearance, where Oregon lost 4-0 to UC Santa Barbara.

All of these accomplishments have come in Kergroach's first — and last — season since transferring from his native Paris. Although he is only a junior, Kergroach plans to return home at the conclusion of this term for personal reasons.

If Kergroach defeats Williams, he will advance to Thursday's second round, where he would face the winner of the first-round match be-

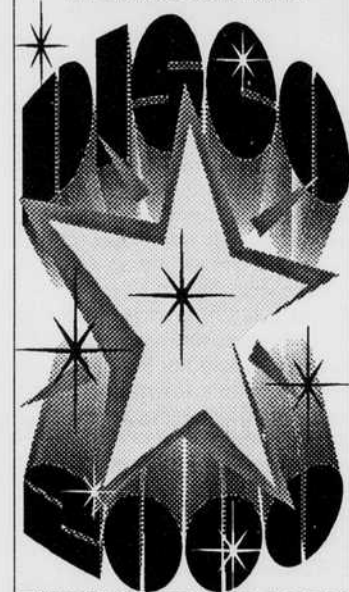

tween Oklahoma State's No. 4 Pavel Kudrnac and Texas Christian's No. 35 Esteban Carril. Kergroach defeated the then-No. 1 Kudrnac on March 29.

Stanford wins NCAA men's tennis title

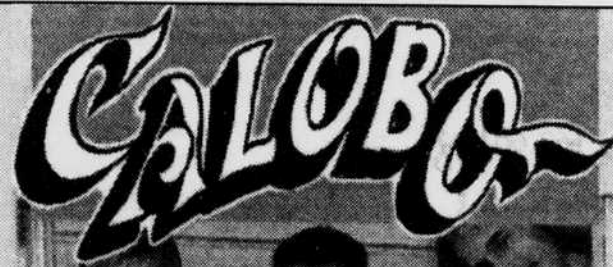
ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — Geoff Abrams won both his singles and doubles matches Tuesday and Stanford completed an unbeaten season with its fourth consecutive NCAA men's tennis championship.

Stanford (28-0) captured its 16th men's tennis championship, the most of any school, with a 4-0 victory over Georgia. The Cardinal shut out all four opponents in the 16-team, single-elimination tournament.

The Cardinal established early momentum by winning the doubles point.

Paul Goldstein and Ryan Wolters defeated Georgia's Hisham Hemeda and Sherif Zaher 8-2 and Abrams and Charles Hoeveler beat Joey Pitts and Michael Lang 8-4.

In singles, Stanford sophomore Bob Bryan scored a quick 6-1, 6-4 victory over Steven Baldas, who had beaten Bryan twice during the regular season.



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
