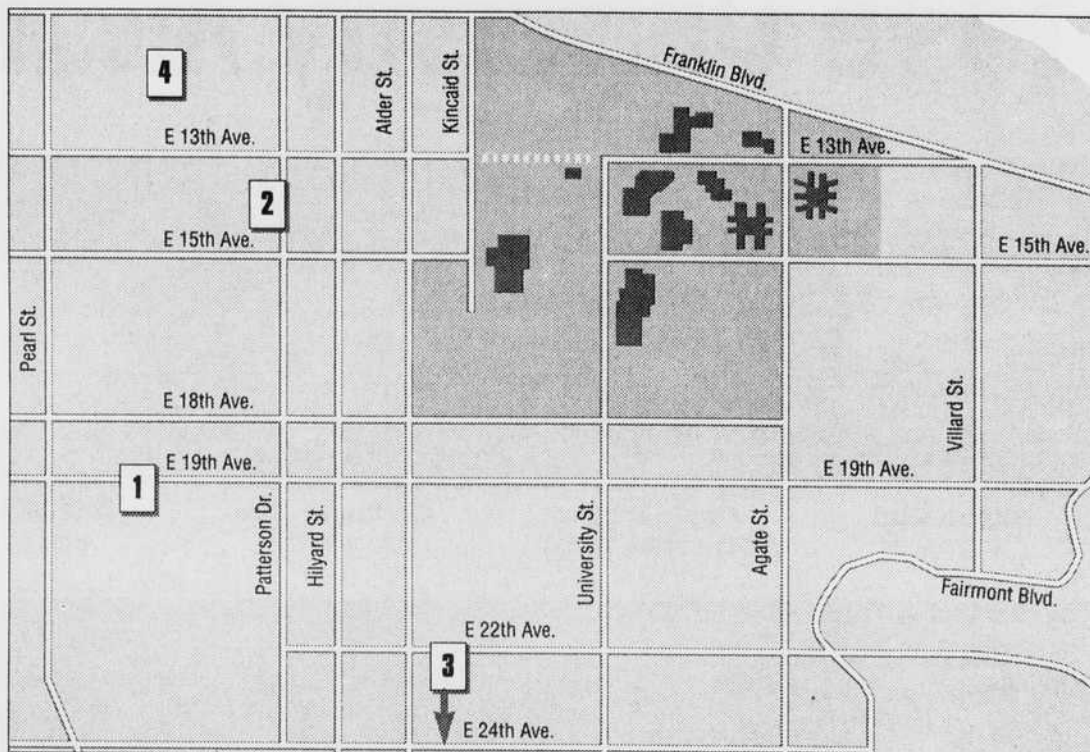

POLICE BEAT



Police issue MIP to 16-year-old boy

1 A 16-year-old Eugene boy was issued a minor-in-possession citation after police caught him with an open can of beer while walking down a sidewalk May 29, according to a police report.

While responding to an unrelated call of a loud party in the 1300 block of East 19th Avenue, officers saw the boy with a can of beer in his hand while walking toward them with a group of males on the sidewalk.

When the group approached the officers, the boy was apparently no longer carrying the can. When questioned about the location of the can, the boy said he never had one. The boy appeared intoxicated and under 21 years old, the report said.

The boy told police he was not carrying any identification and denied drinking any alcohol that evening. Officers said they could smell an odor of alcohol coming from him when he spoke.

The boy was issued a citation and told to return to his home.

Two receive open container violation

2 Two 21-year-old Eugene men, one a University student, were arrested for consuming alcohol on an unlicensed premises after an officer caught them with open beer containers during the early morning of May 30.

While in his patrol car, the officer saw the two men standing at the intersection of East 14th Avenue and Patterson Street. One was holding an open bottle of beer, which appeared to be half-full, and the other had thrown something into a nearby yard.

When the officer approached the two, neither had containers in their hands. Both men appeared and smelled as though they were intoxicated, the report said.

When the officer asked the man he had seen with a bottle what he had done with it, the man said he didn't have one. The second man,

whom the officer saw throw something, admitted to having a beer and said he threw it in the grass.

The second man then retrieved his bottle and poured out the remaining contents. The officer then told the first man to show his bottle so it could be dumped out. The man denied having a beer but later retrieved the bottle and poured it out.

Both men became hostile when the officer told them they were being arrested. The first man told the officer he could not arrest them, and the second man said the officer could not see what was in the bottle from 30 yards away.

The officer then advised them they were arrested because there was alcohol in each of their bottles. Both men were again verbal with the officer, asking him if he had anything better to do and telling him to arrest the "real criminals," the report said.

Police issue student a noise violation

3 Police issued a University student a prohibited noise violation after he refused to stop making noise in his residence May 28, according to a police report.

When officers approached the house, 2643 Kincaid St., they could hear yelling and loud noise coming from the residence from about two houses away, the report said.

Police contacted the resident, who ran back into the house after he had come out the front door and had seen the officers. The officers yelled at him to stop, but he continued into the house and locked the front door. He also locked all the doors and windows in the house, the report said.

Police requested the man come out, and he eventually complied, but only after telephone contact with officers. After speaking with the officers, the resident and his guest refused to hold their noise level down, the report said.

The amount of the citation was \$750.

Officers also issued a minor-in-

possession citation after they arrived at the residence and saw a 20-year-old University student walk out the front door with a mug of beer that was about three-quarters full.

Student cited with noise disturbance

4 A 27-year-old University student was issued a noise disturbance citation after police responded to a complaint of loud noise at his residence May 28.

When officers arrived at the apartment complex, 1255 Mill St., the site of a party, they observed 10 to 15 people standing in front of the man's apartment. The people were talking loudly and consuming alcoholic beverages from plastic cups, the report said.

Police said they could hear the noise from the street, about 75 feet from the complex.

Officers approached the group and asked them to dispose of their beverages and leave the area. Police then contacted the resident, who appeared intoxicated, and asked for his identification, the report said.

The resident then told the officers not to tell him what to do and to leave. Several of the intoxicated partygoers who refused to leave surrounded the officers.

Police then told the man he was arrested, to which he responded that he wanted to be arrested, turning his back to the officers and placing his hands behind his back.

When an officer attempted to arrest the man, he withdrew his hands and ran into the apartment and locked the door. Several people then left the apartment through the front door, leaving it unlocked.

The resident then came out of the apartment at the officers' request. When handed his ticket for the noise violation, he tore it up in the face of the arresting officer and told him he would not appear for his mandatory court appearance.
