

men's tennis (Stanford three consecutive seasons), no team outside the Pac-10 has ascended to the national throne.

Oh yeah, the Cardinal has been awarded the Sears Directors' Cup as the NCAA's best athletics program for two years running as well.

When comparing these impressive numbers with those of other conferences, the Pac-10's superiority becomes even clearer.

The ACC, widely considered the hotbed of collegiate sports, does not stand a chance. After it won two championships in 1995-96, the ACC's official web site was proud to highlight that the conference had a total of 23 titles in six seasons.

As aforementioned, the Pac-10 has 25 titles in the last two seasons.
