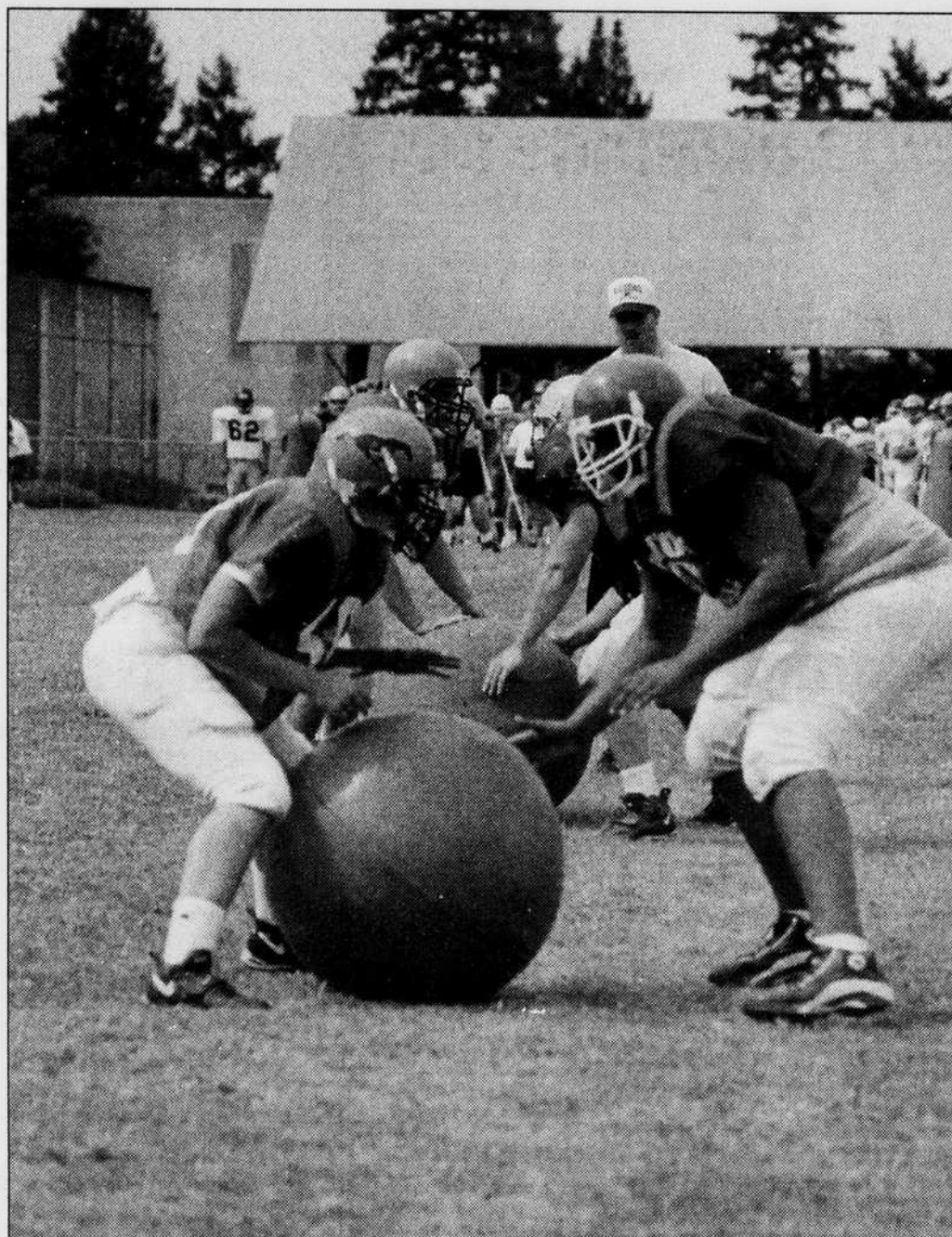

## Clinton orders tobacco survey

*The president wants to  
know which brands are  
popular among teens*

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — President Clinton ordered the government on Monday to ask teenagers which cigarettes they smoke as a step toward nailing down companies' accountability.

Republican leaders, meanwhile, were putting the finishing touches on their own tobacco bill, a much narrower alternative to the legislation defeated last week in what Clinton described as "a brazen act of putting politics over people."

The Republican bill could include up to \$4.3 billion for fighting smoking and drug use by teenagers, but the leaders had not settled on a way to pay for it. One option under discussion was using some of the money that states gain in their lawsuits against the industry, GOP aides said.

The House bill also is expected to cap lawyers' fees and restrict vending machine placement. But it will not contain the lawsuit protection the industry demands. Nor is it likely to include a per-pack increase on cigarette prices.

Three-dozen states are suing tobacco companies to recoup the cost of treating sick smokers.

Most recently, the industry reached a \$6 billion settlement with Minnesota.

The president directed the Department of Health and Human Services to begin collecting information on tobacco use among young people as part of an annual survey on drugs.

Speaking at the annual Family Re-Union conference, with Vice President Al Gore as host, Clinton said the bigger tobacco bill was derailed because "43 senators followed the bidding of the Republican leadership and the tobacco companies."

"It was a brazen act of putting politics over people and partisanship over progress," Clinton said. "No one doubts that this came about, in part, because of an unanswered \$40 million advertising campaign by the tobacco companies which could not be matched by the Cancer Society, the Heart Association, the Lung Association or most of you in this room."

Before leaving the White House, Clinton said he was dis-

appointed by the senators' actions but remained hopeful that tough anti-smoking legislation would pass.

Once the survey results begin to come in, he said, "companies will then no longer be able to evade accountability, and neither will Congress."

The smoking survey will be part of the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, which has been conducted since the early 1970s. Clinton

asked public health officials to expand the number of young people they poll and to collect information on their tobacco use according to brand.

Chris Jennings, Clinton's health policy adviser, said the White House hopes to have the results within a year "so we can actually target the individual companies" that sell the most to young people.

White House spokesman Joe Lockhart said Monday's directive was just the first of several actions Clinton would take to make up for the sidetracked tobacco bill. He declined to say what more Clinton would do or when.
