Struggling Ducks look for wins

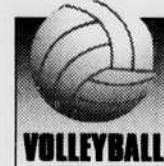
Oregon hopes its new lineup will lead to a victory over the Bears

The Oregon volleyball team will go from one extreme to the other this weekend when it hosts California tonight and No. 7 Stanford on Sunday.

The Bears (4-12 overall, 0-7 Pacific-10 conference) come to McArthur Court on a high note after sweeping George Mason on Oct. 10. It has been an atypical season for California, as head coach Sue Woodstra resigned on Oct. 2 after a three-and-a-half-year reign. First-year assistant coach Lee Maes has taken over and will be looking to lead the Bears to their first conference win.

"They're going to be fired up," Oregon head coach Cathy Nelson said. "They have nothing to lose. It's been an interesting year for them, and I know they're going to come out and fight hard."



Oregon (6-12, 1-6) enters Friday's match with a new line up that emerged last weekend against Washington. Tanja Nikolic and Monique Tobaggi are now starting, and it's a change that appears to have worked well for the Ducks. Oregon's loss to Washington was its closest match of the season, and Tobaggi and Nikolic each recorded career highs in kills with 21 and 12, respectively.

"I just felt like we needed a

change out there," Nelson said. "I felt like we weren't getting enough out of Monique. I also felt like we needed more out of our offense, so we decided to go with Tanja in there."

On Sunday it will be the Ducks that have nothing to lose. Stanford (12-2, 7-0) is looking for its fifth straight Pac-10 title, and has not lost a conference match since 1996.

"No one expects us to win," Nelson said. "But as far as I'm concerned I look at the Pac-10 and no one is unbeatable. We need to play a great match, but it's not beyond us to play a great match."

The Cardinal will be led by junior Kerri Walsh who has committed only two errors in her last five matches and has an amazing .445 hitting percentage.

"We're waiting to see who's healthy this weekend," Heinonen said. "Wisconsin is the clear fa-

vorite, and we want to beat them, but that will depend on people's health. There are a lot of sick people on this campus and also this team."

The Ducks finished in seventh-place last Saturday at the Pre-NCAA, beating Kansas, South Florida and Colorado, all teams which have strong chances of traveling to the NCAA Championships.

Due to a confusion of results at the finish line at the Pre-NCAA, the women were originally given a 10th-place finish.

Senior Marie Davis should be a valuable asset to the team.
