ployee ran the card through a second time after changing the expiration date to Dec. 15, 1999, the card was accepted.

"You can't push us hard enough on this problem," Wyden said.

When the senators did turn to address questions about the impending impeachment hearings, many people voiced their disinterest and some even left the meeting.

Wyden spoke for both senators when he said that they felt the recent conduct of President Clinton was wrong, but the debate currently facing the senate is about the appropriate response to the President's behavior.

"The impeachment is not about punishing the President but protecting the United States of America," said Wyden.

Smith said he doesn't know how he is going to vote on the impeachment trial, but he wants to know the truth.

"The bitter cup of impeachment is now ours to deal with," he said. "We will deal with this fairly and it will be over soon."

Overall, Smith said the sad thing about the impeachment issue is what it has brought into people's homes.

Among other issues addressed by the senators was Measure 67, the measure passed in the November election legalizing marijuana for medical use.

Wyden likened this issue to that of assisted suicide. He said he was able to block attempts made in the senate to overturn Oregon's assisted suicide law because he was backing up the decisions of the people of Oregon. Wyden said he is prepared to do the same thing for medical marijuana if the issue arises.

The issues of homelessness and low-income housing were raised by Richie Weinman, housing and neighborhood development section manager for the city of Eugene plan-

ning and development department.

Wyden addressed the issue and said both he and Smith are on the Senate's budget committee and are trying to balance those particular priorities.

"Work with us and we will try to get these things changed," Wyden said.

Smith summed up the evening and said all the issues being addressed lie ultimately in the hands of the voter.

"By all means please vote, that's the threshold," Smith said. "If you don't vote, you are not heard."

The senators left the meeting wading through a standing ovation after making promises to return for more bipartisan meetings in the future.

are still in trouble," Wortman said.

Wortman said that although she would not veto a negative 2 percent budget, she would rather see a zero percent benchmark sent to the Executive for approval. "It is true that we should keep fees as low as possible, but it is also our duty to tender programs as they grow," said ASUO President Geneva Wortman. "Now programs are making sacrifices when they should be in a position to grow."

A veto of the budget would be a major setback to the process because the numbers would have to

be reworked, Wortman said.

"We try to get the budget to OUS in a timely manner because it reflects badly on the ASUO when we don't," Reid said.

The PFC process starts in the fall when members of the committee are assigned to approximately 12 student groups, or "tag" groups. Committee members coach their assigned tag groups as they design their budget proposals for the next fiscal year.

When presentations are made to the PFC, committee members help their tag groups through the process.

The PFC meets three times a

week, on Monday, Tuesday, and Saturday, to hear budget proposals by individual groups. On Monday and Tuesday, the PFC can usually decide about five budgets a day, and on Saturday a long session is held where the committee hears about 11 or 12 proposals.

For groups that want to appeal their budget decision, one or two sessions are held at the end of the PFC process to review their cases.

"For the most part, groups know the budget process ahead of time," Reid said. "Thankfully, we don't see too many appeals at the end of the session."

would be returning to an empty home.

"There are too many things wrong that can happen if we don't provide a safe, secure, protected area for the young children in our community," Torrey said.

Torrey made next September his goal for the initiation of this program.

The final point Torrey made on his youth agenda was that the community needs to continue its effort to curb drop-out rates.

The final topic Torrey addressed was Eugene's growth management, which will be deeply affected when a new courthouse is built in the downtown area near the Amtrak station on 4th Avenue and Willamette Street.

In addition, the City of Eugene has roughly \$2 mil-

lion to spend on remodeling the Amtrak station. Torrey said the upgrade is needed. He said he also wants to use that money to develop a shuttle system that would run to the bus transfer station, Sacred Heart Medical Center and the University.

Within four months, Torrey wants to have an idea of what the area will look like.

"Rather than letting the events manage us, we possibly can manage them," he said.

At the State of the City Address, which was also an official City Council meeting, Gary Rayer, David Kelly and Gary Papé were sworn in as council members. Pat Farr was also sworn after being re-elected in November. The mayor said goodbye to Tim Laue, Laurie Swanson Gribkov and Ken Tollenaar, who are not returning to the City Council.
