The event, which honors the
Chinese New Year, will be from 5
p.m. to 9 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 24,
in the EMU. The Chinese Student
Association is sponsoring the cele-
bration and providing the enter-
tainment.

Peggy Cheng, public relations
director for the CSA, said China
Night will be both entertaining
and informative.

"China Night's main purpose is
to celebrate the Chinese New
Year," Cheng said. "With the food,
the costumes and the exhibitions,
we are hoping that the public will
be able to learn more about the
Chinese culture."

The festival will begin with an
exhibition and a dinner in the
EMU Concourse Lounge. The pre-
sentation will feature Chinese cal-
ligraphy and painting demon-
strations, some arts and crafts
workshops, a fashion show of tra-
ditional Oriental dress and a video
presentation. The dinner, pre-
pared by members of CSA, will
consist of a wide variety of ethnic
dishes.

Following the exhibition, CSA
will host dances and musical per-
formances in the EMU ballroom.
Traditional folk dances and Chi-
nese instruments will be included
in these demonstrations.

Cheng is hopeful these activities
will facilitate cultural interaction.

"The Chinese population is
kind of big at the University, and I
think it's a good idea for people to
learn more about us," Cheng said.
"Americans and Chinese people
can have a cultural exchange and
learn from one another."

I-Hsiang Liao, another member
of CSA, said China Night's pur-
pose is to teach people about his
country's traditions in an appeal-
ing manner.

"By coming to this event, peo-
ple can see the differences be-
tween Western and Oriental cul-
ture," Liao said. "I encourage
everyone to come to China Night.
This will be the best event of the
year."

purchased at the door or at the
EMU ticket office for \$7. Children
under 3 have free admittance.

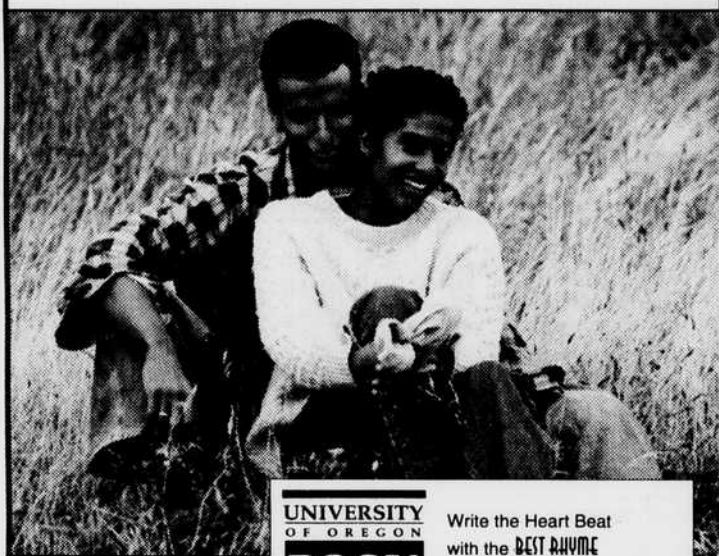
