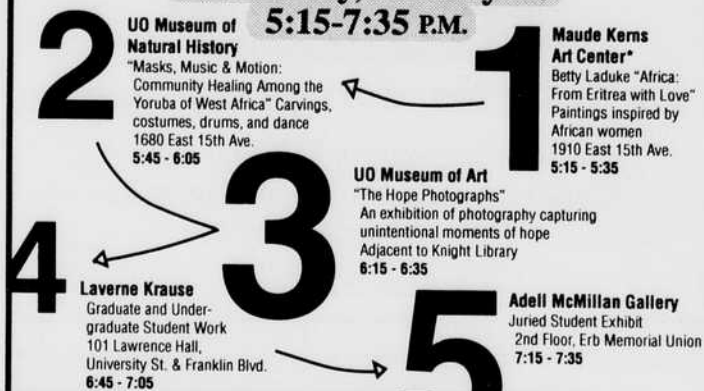

The seminar will encourage students to critically examine the role of alcohol in their lives.

"I'm not telling students not to drink," Mathews said. "My goal is to enlighten students to the risks associated with alcohol and to provide them with the skills needed to avoid problems with alcohol."

Mathews plans to use a dynamic multimedia presentation with videos of students telling their stories, and music and movie clips.

Mathews said he hopes to do away with the myth that college drinking is out of control. A majority of students drink in moderation despite the media focus on college students who drink heavily, Mathews said.

Mace agrees that the perception is that more people are involved in heavy drinking than really are. The seminar is designed to change perceptions about alcohol, she said.

"Our target audience is students who drink, not abuse alcohol," Mace said. "It's not going to be a 'Don't do it' theme."

"It's just about healthy choices that can give you information for a lifetime. He's not discouraging drinking; his focus is on responsible drinking and risk reduction. So one thing he'll talk about is still being able to drink but allowing your body time to recover."

Mathews appeals to students because his presentations are lively and entertaining. Campus communities are his specialty,

Mace said.

The one-day seminars offer one credit for students who attend the full day and complete all assignments, final examinations or projects. The seminars are also open to the public. Community members and professionals can receive attendance certificates for completing the courses.

The cost of each seminar is \$40. Payments must be made before 5 p.m. at the Registrar's Office in 220 Oregon Hall. Both seminars will run from 8 a.m. to 4:50 p.m. in 150 Columbia Hall.

than just a place to buy books, Powell said.

"She really worked as a community center where people could hold meetings and talk," she said. "She gave very scholarly, creative and practical information. She was very affectionate and warm."

And she was passionate about other issues too. She was a founding member of the national organization Old Lesbians Organizing for Change and served on its board for several years.

In recent years, she facilitated a group called Women and Aging at Willamalane Community Center and actively promoted the New Community Meeting, a group facilitating dialogue between local

lesbian and gay communities and conservative Christian groups.

"She always kept up on the important things in the news and the publishing world," Powell said.

"She was always up on feminism and the latest developments and issues. She did have very strong opinions on many things, and she wasn't afraid to share them."

Her work has been acknowledged by those in the community. She was once presented with the Harvey Milk Award from a group called After Eight that is based in Corvallis. She was also given the Pride Achievement Award in honor of exemplary service to the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community in 1997.

"She was a very humble person," Powell said. "She was very aston-

ished that people would acknowledge the work she was doing."

Izzie will continue to be acknowledged and remembered by many in the community.

"The loss will be tremendous," Johnson said. "We've lost a very valuable community member."

A celebration and remembrance of her life will be held from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 23, in the Wheeler Pavilion at the Lane County Fairgrounds.

"Eugene without Izzie is like an umbrella without a handle," Powell said. "What do you do with it?"
