## Ducks continue home dominance over Beavers

Oregon caught fire from the free-throw line to clinch its sixth straight victory over Oregon State on Friday

Jenny Mowe needed cotton swabs to stop a bloody nose, Oregon State center Ericka Brosterhous was checked for a possible dislocated jaw, Sonja Curtis was given eye drops to correct her blurry vision — and that was just the first half!

The Oregon women's basketball team hit 32-of-42 free-throw attempts for the game, including 12 in a row down the stretch to edge Oregon State, 59-46, Friday night in front of the second largest crowd (8,260) ever to watch a women's basketball game at McArthur Court.

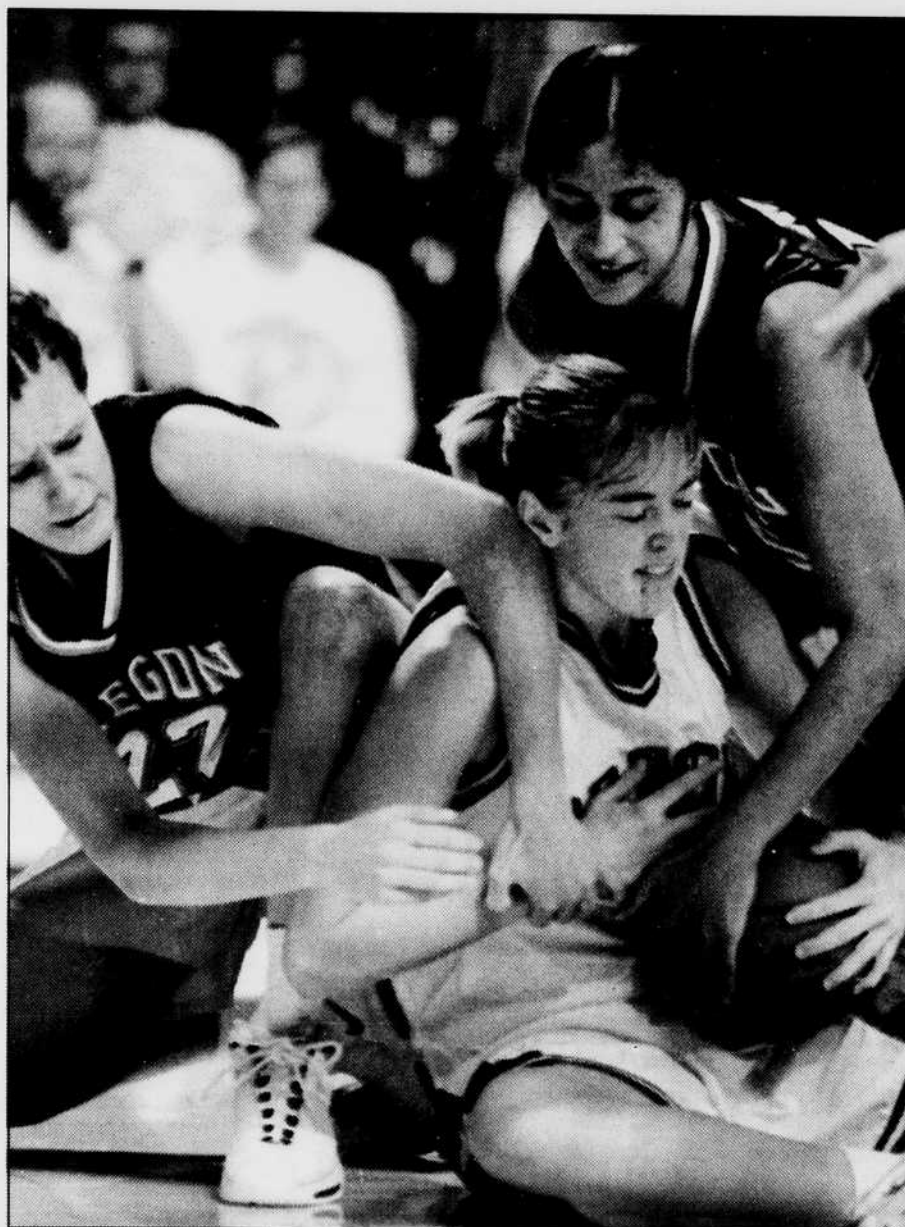
In this feisty Civil War battle between the Pacific-10 Conference's two stingiest defenses, the Ducks (16-4 overall, 7-2 in the Pac-10) proved to be the toughest under the boards and the sharpest from the free-throw line, and now get set to face conference front-runner UCLA on Thursday at Mac Court.

"Coming into the game I told my team that the three ingredients to be successful were hitting your free throws, rebounding and keeping turnovers low," Oregon State head coach Judy Spoelstra said after the game. "We need to get that done to win games and we just weren't able to tonight. If we make our free throws down the stretch, we're right back in the game."

Oregon State (10-8, 2-7) connected on just 10-of-26 attempts from the line during the game, lowering its season average to less than 55 percent, by far the worst in the Pac-10.

But the Beavers' defense kept them in the game. Oregon State never trailed by more than four points in the first half

## UO - OSU more war than civil

Several words could have been used to describe Oregon's 59-46 win over Oregon State last Friday, including brutal and intense. But after the game, Oregon point guard Shaquala Williams probably said it best — "It was ugly."

Ugly before, during and after the 40-minute grudge match.

"We took them by surprise," Oregon State center Ericka Brosterhous said. "I don't think they expected us to come out this strong."

Strong was an understatement. The game turned into a fouling frenzy with elbows flying and players diving all over the court.

In the first 10 minutes Brosterhous took an elbow from Oregon center Jenny Mowe and sat anxiously while the Beavers' trainer checked to make sure her jaw wasn't broken. She would return, and the two would go head to head for the remainder of the game.

"I didn't think she would throw elbows," Brosterhous said. "I told the trainer, 'I have to go back in because this is the Civil War'. I didn't back down, I just started throwing elbows back."

Unfortunately for Mowe, Brosterhous didn't back off, and Mowe would suffer her own ailment — a bloody nose.

"It was pretty physical," Mowe said. "The [referees] were really watching me and I couldn't give back what they were giving me."

## Oregon men misfire, rack up another close loss

Oregon's 10-game Civil War winning streak came to an end as the Beavers extended their home winning streak

CORVALLIS — The first round of the men's basketball Civil War was truly anything but civil.

It was more like drivel.

Oregon scored two points in the final 10 minutes, 38 seconds of the first half, and the two teams combined for 16 more turnovers than assists as Oregon State beat the Ducks, 48-45, in front of 10,400 fans at a sold-out Gill Coliseum on Saturday.

The Beavers (11-7 overall, 5-4 in the Pacific-10 Conference) extended their home winning streak to 10 games and ended a 10-game losing streak to Oregon. The Ducks (10-8, 2-7) have lost four straight games and seven of their last eight.

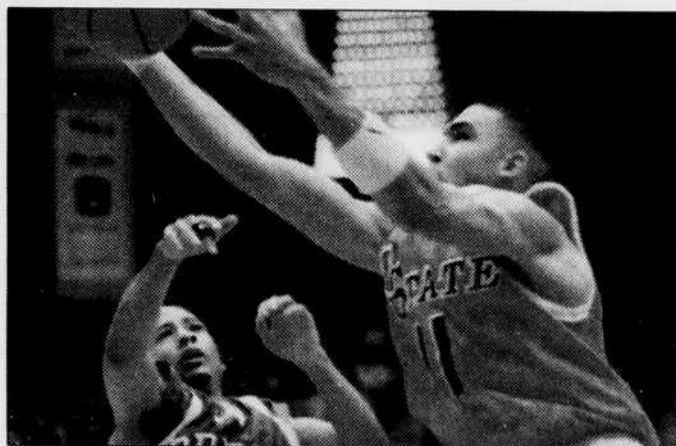
"The thing we have to show is our resiliency and how we're going to bounce back from this," Oregon head coach Ernie Kent said. "Nobody is going to lay down in this conference and feel sorry for Oregon because we've lost all these close games."

Saturday's was the second of five conference road games that did not include overtime for Oregon, and the Ducks' four Pac-10 home games have been lost by a total of nine points.

"It's just frustrating," Oregon guard Darius Wright said. "Everybody on this team, we're all winners, and right now we're not winning any games. Everybody's just frustrated at not winning."

For the seventh straight game, the Ducks had an opportunity to win or tie the game in the closing moments. After two Deandra Tanner free throws put Oregon State
