

Golfers falter in second round

The Ducks' 632 is four strokes behind New Mexico State's 14th place

The Oregon women's golf team remained in 15th place after the second round of the SMU/OSU Challenge in Palos Verdes, Calif.

After opening with a team score of 313 at the par-71 Palos Verdes Country Club on Monday, the Ducks faltered with a five-player total of 319 Tuesday.

Arizona State, which entered the second round five strokes behind first-place UCLA, matched its first-round score of 299. The Bruins, who shot an opening-round 294, slipped into a tie for sixth after their 313 in the second

round.

The Ducks' 632 is 34 strokes behind the Sun Devils and four strokes behind New Mexico State at 14th place.

Pam Snowden moved up two spots into a tie for 24th with her five-over-par 77 to lead the Ducks.

Dawn Berry, who led Oregon with an opening-round 74, slipped to a tie for 61st with an 85 and a two-day total of 159.

Jerilyn White shot 78 and is tied with Berry, Karen Bristow shot a 79 and is tied for 65th with 161 and Angie Rizzo is tied for 84th after improving three strokes to 85.

Tulsa's Stacy Prammanasudh remained the individual leader with a score of 140 heading into today's third round. Prammana-

sudh shot a 72 on Tuesday to stay two strokes ahead of Southern California's Jennifer Rosales.

Rosales' teammate Leila Chartrand is third at 143. Stanford's Stephanie Keever, who was in second place after the first round, shot 75 Tuesday and is tied for fourth. Arizona State's Grace Park is tied with Keever, and Jill Gomric is tied for ninth at 148 to round out the Pacific-10 Conference players in the top 10.

Besides the Sun Devils, Bruins and Ducks, USC is tied for second at 602, the Cardinal is fifth overall at 605 and Arizona is tied with UCLA.

Next for the Ducks after today's final round is the Pioneer Electronics/Bruin Tournament at Manifee Country Club in Manifee, Calif., from Feb. 22-24.

Hockey beats Palmer in overtime shootout

Surviving what the Oregon Club Sports hockey team called subpar officiating, the Ducks swept Palmer College 7-6 and 11-4 last weekend in Medford.

Oregon (18-4-1) won its first shootout of the season Saturday in a game that the team appeared to have in its back pocket until a controversial call was made by officials.

Oregon defender Chris Geib was involved in an altercation with a Palmer player at the beginning of the third period that the officials did not have a good look at.

When Oregon forwards Thomas Mele and Jeff McGillis asked the referee for a ruling, both were penalized for insubordination and forced to sit out the remainder of regulation.

"The officiating was the worst I have seen all year," said Mele of the Pacific-8 Conference referees. "I think the head referee doesn't care for us too much, because there were two or three calls that were ridiculous."

McGillis, who had three goals up to that point, was sorely missed as he watched

his team's 5-2 lead dissolve to a 6-6 tie, then watched as Palmer scored with just 40 seconds remaining on a shot that ricocheted off the goalpost and off Oregon goalie Josh Hardin's back into the net.

However, Hardin didn't buckle under pressure, allowing only one of Palmer's shots to get past him in the shootout. Oregon prevailed by one goal.

"I told Josh before the shootout to go out and have fun, and he wasn't nervous," Mele said. "I have never seen a goalie who played as hot as Josh did Saturday night."

Frustration mounted for Palmer on Sunday, a team Mele said were "using their sticks like Zorro." After falling behind 4-0 early, Palmer's repeated attempts to draw Oregon players into scuffles were ignored, thanks to the discipline coach Ezra Louthis has instilled in his players.

"Ezra made sure we knew we had everything to lose," said Mele, referring to the possibility of suspension in the upcoming Pac-8 tournament that could result from fighting. "Everyone respects him and wouldn't let it happen."

Women's soccer signs three new players

The Oregon women's soccer team bolstered an already strong returning class with the signing of three recruits, head coach Bill Steffen announced Tuesday.

Julie McLellan, Lindsey Peterson and Ellen Sims join a Ducks team that in 1998 had the best season of its three-year existence.

McLellan, a 5-foot-3 forward from Vernon, British Columbia,

was the leading scorer for the provincial British Columbian team from 1994-97.

"Julie is very athletic and strong," Steffen said. "She's a dynamic player who goes right at people and wants to score goals."

Peterson, a 5-1 defender from Port Orchard, Wash., was a three-time member of the Washington Olympic Development Program and a two-year participant in the regional camp.

"Lindsey is a brilliant defender

who's deceptive," Steffen said. "She's not very big, but she's wiry, determined and disciplined. She's also strong for her size and good on the ball. If we need something done, Lindsey will get it done."

Finally, Sims is a 5-7 midfielder from Signal Mountain, Tenn., who played for the Tennessee Under-14 Region III Olympic Development Program in 1996. She was a member of two state-champion teams for her age groups, in both 1992 and 1994.

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
