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very disrespectful."

In addition to his confession, Hartley noted that he was upset that he never received the initial e-mail about the meeting. Sturges' records confirm Hartley did not receive the e-mail, and Sturges apologized for the error. But Hartley added that Sturges had called him.

The meeting itself has come under fire from candidates still on the ballot.

Student Senate candidate Autumn DePoe expressed displeasure about the inflexibility of the meeting.

"Last year I also had a conflict, and [Sturges] let me sit down one-on-one," DePoe said. "This year I also had class, and I was not allowed to do this."

Holocaust

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will explain how societies possess traits that make genocides possible.

Hillel President Carrie Binder said she believes another Holocaust can be prevented by learning about the past and about the capabilities of humans.

"The Holocaust wasn't just a random act," Binder said. "It proved what we can be like, although we don't want to admit it or face it again. Now we have to recognize the symptoms to make sure genocides and other crimes against humanity are stopped."

In places such as Africa, Tibet and Kosovo, genocides similar in nature to the Holocaust are still occurring. The issue of mass exterminations and how to stop them will be discussed at a forum from 6 to 9 p.m. tonight in the EMU Ben Linder Room.

"It will be a chance for people to learn something about what's going on in the rest of the world," Poplack said. "From working with victims of torture to doing political activism, students will be shown how help end these atrocities."

The last events of Holocaust Remembrance Week include an intergenerational panel discussion and two art presentations.

Holocaust survivor Esther Wasserman will speak along with her daughter and granddaughter at a forum Thursday from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Knight Library Browsing Room. The three women will relate how the Holocaust has affected their personal lives as well their family.

The granddaughter, University student Jessica Langer, said she chose to discuss the Holocaust to teach people about the effects genocide has on families.

"I wanted to put a name and a face to a story," Langer said. "For me, I am still confused on why so many people had to die just because they were Jewish. Because of the Holocaust, most of my family members had been killed."

Poplack said that with the help of Langer's family and the other speakers this week, anyone — from those just beginning to learn about the Holocaust to scholars

DePoe decided to skip her class to attend the meeting this year. She said that the meeting violated her rights under the ASUO's Rules Guide Book, section 12.1, which states that the "educational atmosphere of the University shall not be compromised"

"I talked to Autumn and she ended up being there for the full time ...," Sturges said. "I was wondering why — if she had class — why didn't she go to at least half of her class?"

Presidential candidate Tamir Kriegel agreed with DePoe about the meeting.

"This rule has never been enforced," Kriegel said. "I think it was bunk. They had nothing to tell us anyway. It was just to weed them out."
