"They were very conscientious human beings," Terrel said. "That was what really made me want to study law and do it here at the University of Oregon."

The environment of the law school is unique because of its long standing commitment to public service and the students focus on cooperation, not competition, said Ethan Knight. He was selected by the third-year student body as the graduating-class speaker. He talked about the importance of being civil.

"Civility is something missing

in society today," Knight said. "Being rude has become standard currency. To many, we are not getting law degrees but a license to meddle, confuse and otherwise interfere in people's lives, and we need to change that perception by being civil."

The graduating class chose Judge Susan P. Graber, U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, to deliver the keynote address.

"Remember it takes time to build and learn the law," Graber said. "Be patient. Lay one brick at a time. Respect and treat kindly all who work with you

and for you. Remember that although law in this country is adversarial, one must use civility."

The ceremony was followed by a reception in the commons area of the new William Knight Law Center.

The new law school is a state-of-the-art building funded by gifts from alumni and friends and a lead gift made by Phil Knight in honor of his father, a 1932 law school graduate. Knight committed \$10 million to the building project. The new building is 138,000 square feet with double the law library space.

"We need to have the opportunity to catch this person," she said.
