crowd of people here."

Pace-setter Kris Ihle of Nike-International set a tempo that was unusually fast for the 1,500.

While Knudson was able to brave the pace, Davis and teammate Katie Crabb struggled toward the end. Both fell short of NCAA qualifying times with respective finishes of 4:25.47 and 4:28.39.

Davis already has a solid NCAA mark in the 1,500, but Crabb does not. However, she is confident she can run a faster time at the Pac-10s.

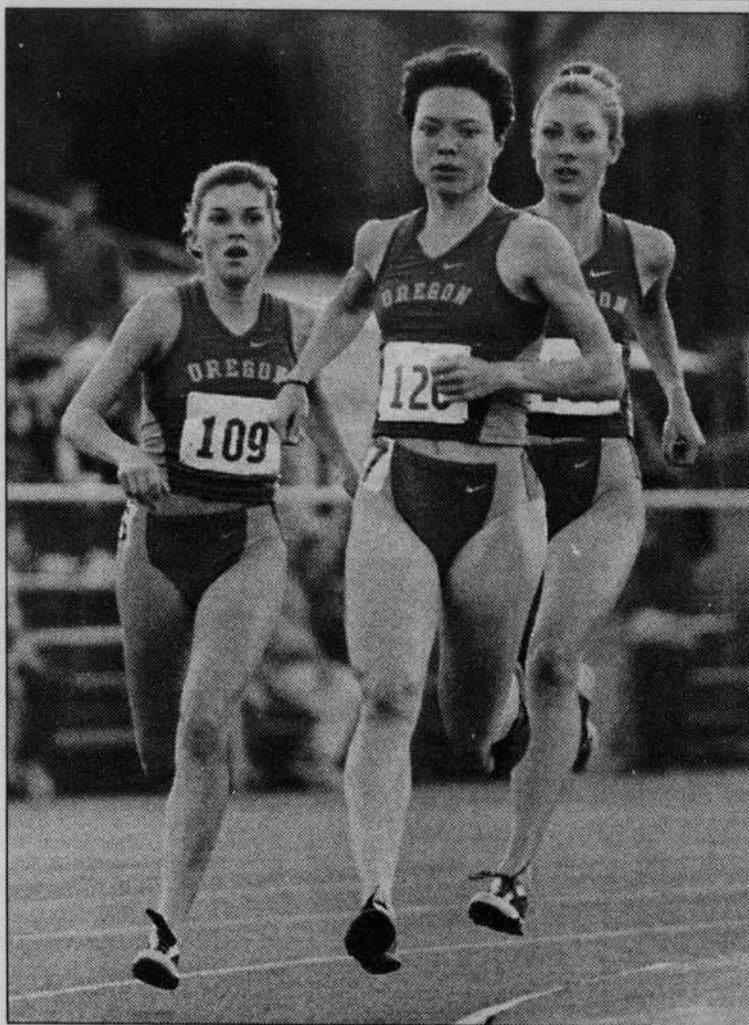
"I definitely think I can run a provisional time, it's just a matter of putting all the pieces together. For me, I run a better race if it is smooth all the way around. Hopefully, I'll just hold myself back and run my own race at the Pac-10's and try to go for it there."

Also searching for an NCAA-qualifying mark was Tish Henes in the 400 hurdles. Henes, an NCAA qualifier for the past three years, fell short of her goal with a third-place finish of 1:00.90.

Henes said the impact of the meet being her last at Oregon was a key factor in the outcome of her race.

"I don't feel very good about how I competed at all," Henes said. "I was having a lot of emotions about this being the last time I would be on this track in a green uniform, but I wish I would have finished it a little bit better."

In the hammer throw, Heather Hill captured a Pac-10 mark on her last throw with a distance of 156 feet, 11 inches. Heidi Fisk took second, throwing 175-11, and each of

her throws were over 175.

Holly Speight approached 12 feet in the pole vault and won the event with a mark of 11-11 3/4. Her mark was the closest she's been to clearing 12 feet in two months.

Elstrom finished second, tying Speight's clearance.

Hilary Holly won the long jump with a 19-0 1/2 leap, and teammate Stacy Robson finished third with a mark of 18-2 1/2.

Goucher ran the Twilight's first sub-four-minute mile since 1991 (3:57.63) and finished six seconds ahead of Ian Gillespie, the two-time defending champion. As Goucher crossed the finish line, the announcer said, "And it's faster than the mile they ran earlier in Portland."

"We had a really good weekend and got through it with no injuries, which is a good thing. It was a good tuneup for the Pac-10s and the NCAAs."

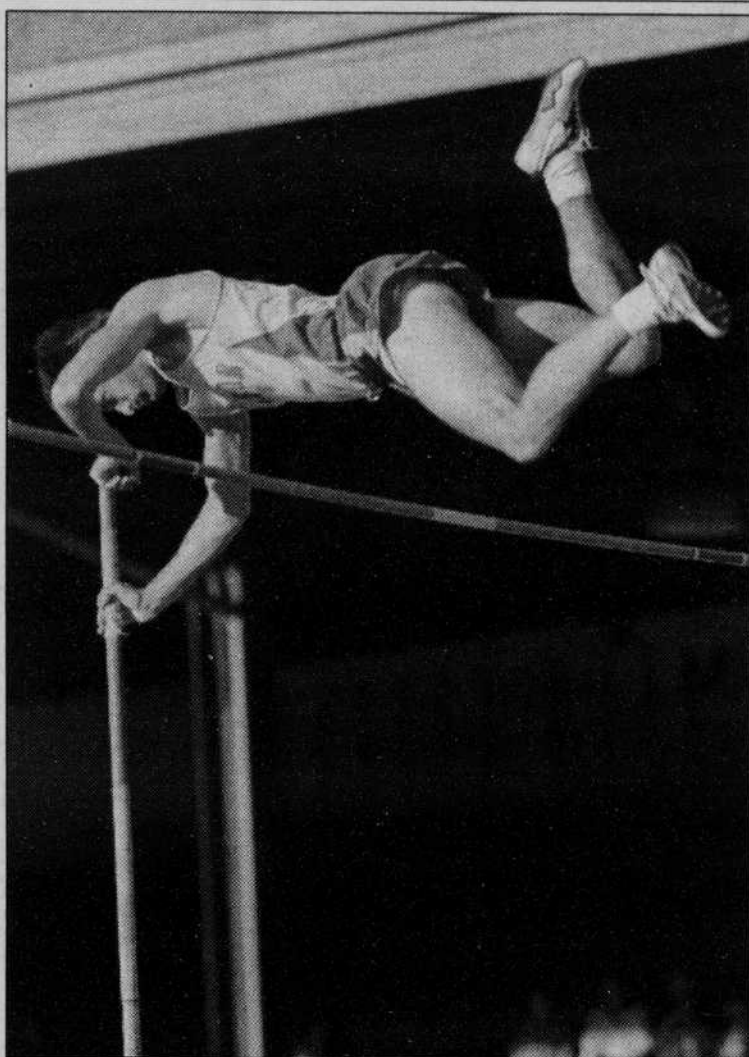

"When they told me I couldn't run in Portland I thought, 'I'll come to Eugene and it'll be a lot more fun,'" Goucher said. "This is what I love about Eugene — the crowd is incredible. This was my first sub-four-minute mile and I wanted to run faster than they did in Portland."

In the shorter distances — the 100 and 200 — Oregon dominated, finishing in first, second and third in the 400 and taking the top two spots in the 200. Junior Nat Johnson took first in the 200 with a season-best time of 21.97, followed by Jermaine Hanspard (22.15).

"It's always nice to win," Johnson said. "I'm excited to run a seasonal best, and it's good preparation for the 400."

But it was junior Howard Moore who was victorious in the 400, after missing the last two

weeks of competition. Moore showed no sign of injury as he crossed the finish line at 47.51 followed by Ross Krempley (48.04) and Johnson (48.53).

Moore has qualified for the Pacific-10 Conference meet in both the 200 and 400 while Krempley is qualified for the 800.

Oregon also dominated the

javelin as Ryan Keith and Shawn Rasmor — both Pac-10 qualifiers — finished second and third, respectively, behind Thomas.
