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Buciarski finished the regular season at the Pacific-10 Conference meet with victories in the steeplechase and the pole vault, respectively.

With national experience in tow, all three expected career-best results this season. Davis finished third in the steeplechase preliminaries Thursday and said he was feeling relaxed heading into Saturday's finals.

But things didn't work out the way Davis planned, as he finished 12th with a time of 9 minutes, 14.62 seconds. Defending champion Matt Kerr repeated his performance of last season with a victory in 8:44.29, helping Arkansas edge Stanford for the team victory, 59-52. It was Arkansas second victory in as many years.

"I was really tired, and I had a cold heading into the week," Davis said. "The preliminaries took a lot out of me, and I felt like I never recovered from that. I had high hopes going in, and it just didn't materialize."

Fein recorded Oregon's only two points in the meet with a seventh-place finish in the 5,000 on Friday, and Oregon finished the meet in a tie for 65th. Although Fein has previously competed at nationals, this was his first time competing for Oregon after transferring from Wisconsin in following first-year head coach Martin Smith.

"I'm pretty happy," Fein said. "I ran a really smart race, but did-

n't close the way I wanted to. The team didn't have a great meet, but we're in a transition period. Transitions are really tough, but I'll do what I can to help the program."

Perhaps the most disappointing performance for Oregon was Buciarski's no height in the pole vault. Gusto winds brought the heights down for all of the vaulters, but Buciarski never managed to make a clean vault at any height.

Buciarski cleared 18 feet, 2 1/2 inches earlier this season and was ranked fourth heading into the NCAA Championships.

"When you come into the national championships you want to perform your best," Smith said. "Unfortunately for us, that just wasn't the case. I know the athletes are very disappointed, and I'm very disappointed for them because I know how hard they've worked."

While Fein has another season to run for Oregon, this was the last shot at a national title for Davis and Buciarski. However, Davis will compete at the USA Outdoor Championships in Eugene on June 24-27, donning his Oregon uniform for the last time at Hayward Field.

"I know the race didn't indicate my fitness or ability to run," Davis said. "Mentally, I was ready to run a good race, but my body wasn't cooperating. I still get to wear the Oregon jersey [at the championships], and I get satisfaction running in an Oregon jersey here in Eugene."

Golf

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his lineup as the Ducks lose four influential seniors.

Adrian Burtner, who was voted a second-team Pacific-10 Conference selection this season, captured individual titles at the Wolfpack Classic and the Duck Invitational while posting a 73.6 average, second best on the team behind Ben Crane.

Crane's 72.9 average led Oregon and earned him honorable-mention all-conference recognition. As a junior last season, Crane was a second-team all-conference selection and led the team in top-10 finishes with nine.

Derek Croskrey and Jeff Barney

will be missed as well. Croskrey tied for 12th at the Pac-10 tournament, boosting the Ducks to third place in the team standings. Although Barney didn't play in many of the tournaments this season, his career was highlighted by a 13th-place finish at Pac-10s as a sophomore.

Lavoie knows the four seniors will be missed.

"It was fun while it lasted and I'm going to miss them, but we're going to be OK next year," Lavoie said.

Nosler is confident that his next squad will match, if not eclipse, the standard set by the 1999 Ducks.

"We have a couple guys coming in, so we'll be pretty solid," Nosler said. "We'll be competitive and we won't go back a long ways, if at all."



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
