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# Senate hears money matters

*Special requests are all the rage at the second summer Senate meeting*

The ASUO Summer Student Senate met Tuesday to discuss special requests by the Westmoreland Tenants Council and the Multicultural Center.

The Westmoreland Tenants Council, which represents the Westmoreland Family Housing Apartments, requested a new computer for the tenant computer room. According to council representative Tom Cassidy, the computer room currently has three older computers to serve the approximately 1,000 students who live in the complex during the fall.

"We feel that due to the dis-

ance of the apartments from campus, and the age of our current machines, a newer computer is needed by fall term in order to keep our computer room up to date," Cassidy said.

However, the Senate decided to table the motion indefinitely and have the tenants council explore other funding options or possibly acquire a donated computer from the University. One Senate member said that the ASUO does not normally grand requests to fund computers for student groups, but the unique situation of the Westmoreland residents, who on average possess lower incomes than most traditional students or have families,

precluded the Senate from dismissing it altogether.

The ASUO then considered a request by the Multicultural Center to allocate \$750 to help pay for its members to attend a conference hosted by the National Association of Black Journalists in Seattle on Wednesday.

The ASUO approved the request, and Senate member and ASUO Vice President Mitra Anourhiravi said, "It is important to give students these kind of opportunities."

The money allocated by the ASUO will go toward the lodging of members who want to attend the conference but have a financial hardship.

After a brief internal debate over the correct size of the summer Senate, the meeting adjourned. The Senate will hold its next meeting on Monday, August 9.
